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5. (Confidential - PLC) Met with Al Tarabochia, Chief Investigator, Senate Judiciary Subcommittee on Internal Security, and gave him a brief rundown of the results of Agency checks on the Cuban woman recently in a newspaper photograph in whom he was interested and whose name he had furnished. He asked if I would check to see if any further information could be provided.

6. (Confidential - PLC) Met with Duke Short, Senior Investigator, Senate Judiciary Subcommittee on Internal Security. Short said he had talked to the FBI and furnished them the information that [redacted]

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[redacted] He said the FBI indicated they were unaware of this information and they would be checking with the Agency to arrange an interview with [redacted] on the case. [redacted] Branch, was advised.

(Internal Use Only - PLC) Mike Cavanagh, Staff Assistant, House Post Office and Civil Service Subcommittee on Postal Facilities, Mail, and Labor Management, called to inquire as to when they would be receiving the letter from the Director confirming the acceptance to appear before the Subcommittee on 10 July 1975 to discuss the mail survey program. I told him that the letter was being finalized but had not been submitted to the Director. I hoped that he would receive it in a day or two.

9. (Unclassified - RJK) David Paxton, on the staff of Representative Carroll Hubbard (D., Ky.), called to request a copy of the Agency publication entitled "Chiefs of State and Cabinets of Foreign Governments." I told him we would put one in the mail to him.

10. (Unclassified - RJK) George Stringfellow, on the staff of Representative Richard Preyer (D., N. C.) called to ask a number of questions about the Murphy Commission.

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15. (Internal Use Only - BAA) Called Donna Larsen, in the office of Jack Marsh, Counsellor to the President, to find out if she had come up with anything on the status of the U-2 transcripts. She apologized and said she had forgotten to do this but would check on it right away and be back in touch.

16. (Confidential - LLM) Called John Ford, House Armed Services Committee staff, and told him that the best advice I had received was to translate the exchange of correspondence with the Somalis into Arabic. Ford said he still would like to have the letters translated into Russian and I told him we would still plan on providing the substantive briefings early Thursday morning but that I would call first for confirmation of their availability.

17. (Unclassified - DFM) Called Tom Hart, Senator Robert C. Byrd's (D., W. Va.) aide on the ~~Senate Judiciary Committee~~, and arranged to see him Thursday at 2:00 p.m. with [redacted] to cover legislation of interest to the Agency under consideration by the Judiciary Committee. 25X1A

Friday - 27 June 1975

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1. (Unclassified - DFM) Took a call from Cathy, in the office of Representative Jerry M. Patterson (D., Calif.). She seemed to think that CIA was behind the airlifting of refugees from Vietnam by World Airways, and was quite surprised when I denied this assertion.

2. (Unclassified - PLC) Delivered to the four oversight committees copies of the 26 June 1975 letter to Senator Charles H. Percy (R., Ill.), Ranking Minority Member, Senate Subcommittee on Permanent Investigations on [redacted]

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3. (Confidential - PLC) Delivered to the office of Representative Jack F. Kemp (R., N. Y.) background information concerning the Agency's budget, oversight, etc. Mr. Cary had promised this to Kemp.

4. (Internal Use Only - PLC) Picked up for review a copy of the transcript of the Director's testimony of 25 June 1975 before the House Government Operations Subcommittee on Government Information and Individual Rights, from Nancy Wenzel, on the Subcommittee staff.

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5. (Internal Use Only - PLC) Discussed with Kim Johnson, Staff Assistant to Representative Ronald A. Sarasin (R., Conn.); a letter from Sarasin to the Agency on behalf of a constituent, [redacted] who is interested in the whereabouts of [redacted]

[redacted] and were reported to have been working for the CIA at the time. I assured Ms. Johnson that a check of our records failed to reveal any information indicating that either had in any way been associated with the Agency.

6. (Internal Use Only - FMC) Spoke with Sarah Gibson, in the office of Representative Edward W. Pattison (D., N. Y.), and told her that in answer to her previous call to the office, the answer to Pattison's letter of 10 June 1975 would be forthcoming.
