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9. [redacted] Received a call from Mr. Joe Murray, International Division GAO, who said that General Giller of ERCA had referred him to CIA to obtain information on the effectiveness of export controls and of international safeguards and on unaccounted for nuclear material. Murray said GAO is doing a study on peaceful cooperation on nuclear energy for the House International Relations Committee and indicated that interest in the subject had been sparked by Senator Charles H. Percy (R., Ill.). I told Murray we would be back in touch with him. In response to my observation that I thought the Joint Committee on Atomic Energy had exclusive access to Restricted Data and this would seem to involve such material, Murray said that they had access to such information and the appropriate clearances.

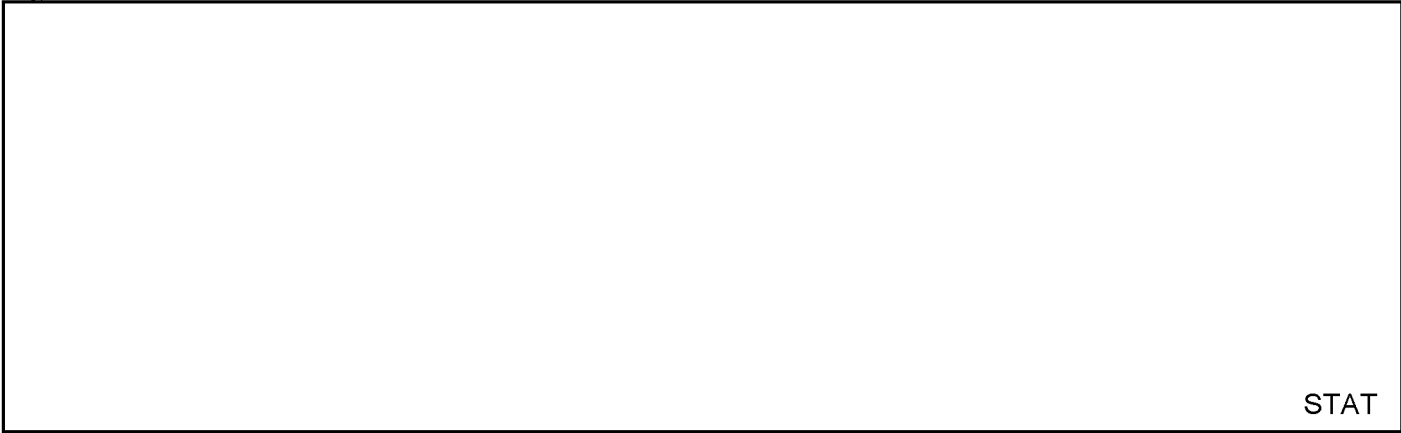
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10. [redacted] Called Julie Pineau, in the office of Representative Paul N. McCloskey (R., Calif.), to arrange for an appointment for Messrs. [redacted] with Mr. McCloskey to discuss his 6 June 1975 request to the Agency. The Representative will not return until 8 July and Ms. Pineau will advise us when an appointment would be convenient. 25X1

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11. [redacted] Called Bill Wells, Technical Consultant, House Committee on Science and Technology Subcommittee on Science, Research and Technology, and asked that he not send a formal request to the Agency concerning the study by the Subcommittee until we could talk further and get a better understanding of his request. (See Journal Item #11, 26 June 1975) I emphasized that the Agency might not be able to contribute to the study. He said he had been thinking it over since his call to me last week and he is leaning more toward not making a request on the Agency at this time. He asked that no action be taken and if he wants an Agency input, he will call back.

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12. [redacted] Returned the earlier call of John Flint, House Select Committee staff, who was interested in a bibliography of works on the Agency in intelligence. I told him I thought he could get whatever he needed from the Library of Congress on an unclassified nature and he said he had already received a long listing from the Library but they referred him to CIA because of our "excellent library." I suggested he send to us the listing that he had been provided and we would augment it, but he said it was too bulky. I told him I would see what we could do and advised Walt Elder, Review Staff.

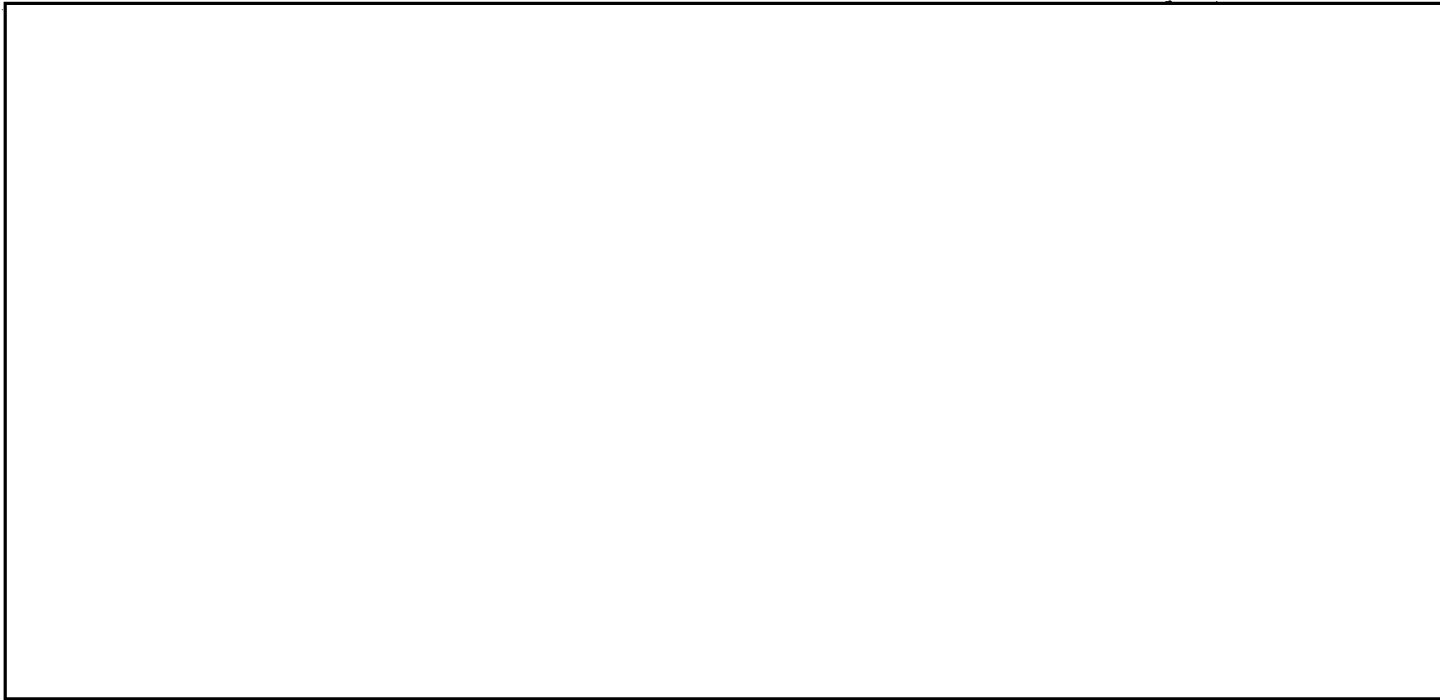

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5. [redacted] Called Ron Tammen, on the staff of Senator William Proxmire (D., Wisc.), and we chatted briefly about the Director's briefing of Senator Proxmire's Joint Economic Committee Subcommittee on Priorities and Economy in Government. We both agreed it was a useful session. Tammen mentioned that Senator Proxmire would be making a speech in the next few days supporting the Agency's intelligence-gathering and analysis functions.

I told Tammen that I had intended to give him a copy of the Director's letter to Elmer Staats on the subject of GAO audit of Agency funds. I told him this was in the nature of a comment on the letter Mr. Keller wrote to Senator Proxmire last year on this subject which the Senator placed in the Congressional Record in February of this year. I told Tammen that we had taken the time to check our files and make a careful review of this subject since we felt Keller's letter gave an erroneous impression of the circumstances surrounding the decision to terminate the GAO audit some years ago. I told him I would send a copy of the letter to him today.

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6. [redacted] Received a call from Foster Collins, Treasury. In response to his request I gave him a report on the status of legislation amending the National Security Act which were originally introduced by Senator John C. Stennis (D., Miss.) and Representative Lucien N. Nedzi (D., Mich.) last year.

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7. [redacted] Delivered to J. C. Argetsinger, Senate Committee on the Judiciary staff, and Gary Clary, aide to Senator Strom Thurmond (R., S. C.), a blind memorandum on S. 1210, which would amend the Freedom of Information Act.

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8. [redacted] Delivered to the office of the Senate Committee on Foreign Relations for David Keaney a copy of "Law of the Sea Country Study--Nigeria." 25X1

20. [redacted] Shirlee McGloon, administrative assistant to Representative J. William Stanton, (R., Ohio), phoned to inquire how a constituent in Columbus, Ohio would go about reporting to the Agency information which he believed was of significant intelligence value. Apparently, the constituent in question had once been in military intelligence. I told her I would get back to her with the information.

21. [redacted] Called Ralph Malvik, Office of Management and Budget, and inquired as to the status of the Agency's proposal to amend the CIA Retirement Act. Malvik said he had asked for comments from two agencies--the Civil Service Commission and Treasury. He had heard from Treasury and they had no problems with the funding proposal. He had not as yet heard from the Civil Service Commission and thought they might have some problems. Once he hears from them, the measure will be cleared for submission to the Congress.

I subsequently called [redacted] DD/PERS, and he said he would immediately call his contacts in the Civil Service Commission and see what the hold-up was.

22. [redacted] Received a call from Andy Gabriel, in the Legislative Liaison office of the Vice President, and discussed in general the Agency's handling of requests by individuals under the Freedom of Information Act for any information that the Agency may have concerning them. Gabriel wanted this as information in handling requests which he has been receiving from individuals from time to time.

23. [redacted] Mike Cavanagh, Staff Assistant, House Post Office and Civil Service Subcommittee on Postal Facilities, Mail, and Labor Management, called to advise us that the letter to the Director requesting his appearance to discuss the mail survey program would be ready for pick up tomorrow morning, 19 June 1975, in the office of Chairman Charles H. Wilson (D., Calif.). Cavanagh said the date for the meeting would be left open since the original date of 24 June presents problems. I again made it clear that there was no firm commitment being made as to the Director's appearance.

24. [redacted] Received a call from Al Tarabochia, Senate Judiciary Subcommittee on Internal Security staff, who asked for the Cuban ambassadors to Panama and Portugal. After calling LA Division and checking with [redacted] I called Tarabochia back and gave him these names.

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
