Price of gold: Price of gold on Djakarta market has increased from 43 rupiahs on September 1 to 50.5 rupiahs on September 23. Upswing reported to be result of rumors of shrinking gold coverage. Gold and foreign exchange holdings have decreased rupiahs 562.2 million since beginning 1954, and proportion reserve to current liabilities decreased from 25.1 to 20.7 percent over same period. Some sources attribute it also to manipulation of certain circles seeking to weaken Indo's economy.

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what what?

Export of rubber: Government has announced that there will be no (repeat no) export duty on rubber for fourth quarter 1954. For payment of statistical tax and foreign exchange institute defect price of estate rubber for fourth quarter fixed at rupiahs 5.07 per kilo.

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Economic developments:

Bank of Indonesia report for first half 1954 shows that during period money supply increased rupiahs 1038.8 million; government floating debt rose rupiah 1,571 million, brining total government debt June 30 to rupiah 14,871 million; foreign exchange deficit of rupiah 1,334 million, most of which financed by decrease in gold and foreign exchange reserves; retail price indices showed decline while cost of living for civil servants increased although that for unskilled labor decreased.

(In reality, this income group-once made up of intermediate and senior Dutch and Eurasian functionaries, now refers to a depressed class of Eurasians—persons trying to live according to lowest European standards and facing austerity by receiving only subsistence wages—comparable to those of many messengers).

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Rubber industry: Trade circles in Palembang report that due shortage slabs, almost entire rubber remilling Sumatra shut down, with 3500 workers unemployed and on 35 percent pay. Rumors of special export license of 6000 tons blamed. Price bids per 100 kgs. rose from rupiah 250 to rupiah 300 wet slabs, and rupiah 290 to rupiah 330 dry slabs, with none offered.

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Czech offer: Press reports that Czechoslovakia has offered to build and equip sugar factories in Indonesia. Report ties in with statement Sultan Buwono that Jogja administration considering offer of machinery and experts for construction sugar factory in Jogja. Construction expected to start 1955, and operations 1956. Approximately 10,000 workers to be employed.
