This is a follow-up to our telephone conversation two weeks ago when I asked for an Agency briefing on Panama for a group of twelve federal executives who will visit Panama later this month as part of my foreign policy seminar. Enclosed for your information is the roster of seminar participants, all of whom are senior employees of the U.S. government. [REDACTED] is from CIA.

The preferred time for this briefing is Tuesday, November 28, in the early afternoon. We will be at the Pentagon in the morning and would enjoy the opportunity to have lunch at your Headquarters. We will, of course, pay for our meals. The briefing could then take place from 1:30 until 3:00 p.m.

We discussed what level of classification the briefing should be, and I am of the view that it is best to handle this group the same as you would a group of business executives whose reliability is not in question. Each member of this group is a responsible executive in the federal service, and they understand that our briefings in State, Defense and with you are completely off-the-record. Our main interest is to obtain good background knowledge about the politics, culture and economics of Panama so that we can better judge the future of relations between that country and the United States, particularly as treaty negotiations on the Canal Zone resume. We will receive briefings from Country Director Morey Bell, and Ambassador David Ward in the State Department on November 27.

It would greatly simplify our logistics if you could arrange for the group to be picked up at the Pentagon at 12:00 noon, as you did on a previous occasion. We can take cabs back to Washington at 3:00 p.m. if your office would order them.

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These visits of my seminar to CIA have proved to be so worthwhile in the past that I feel we should try to include it in each foreign policy field trip. I am pleased that we are able to work this one out for November 28.
