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I personally know the CIA. I have done work for them; they have done work for me; I respect them; I believe I still have the 'clearances.' It would cost almost as much to organize for and develop the three as it would for the whole. would have to direct this himself. No one else is capable. May I ask in round numbers what you've budgeted for this effort?"

On the defensive at this point, I mentioned that the CIA also had budget problems, that we weren't yet completely sold on PI, that we proposed to use the three units as PAI and that other agencies of the Government would benefit, etc.
