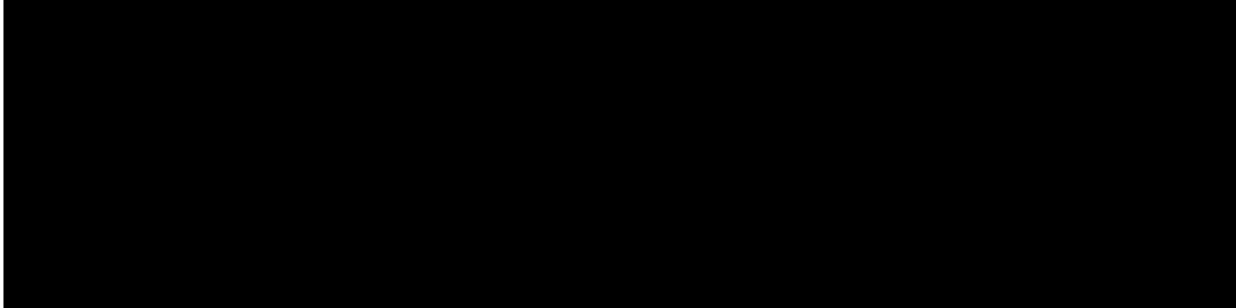

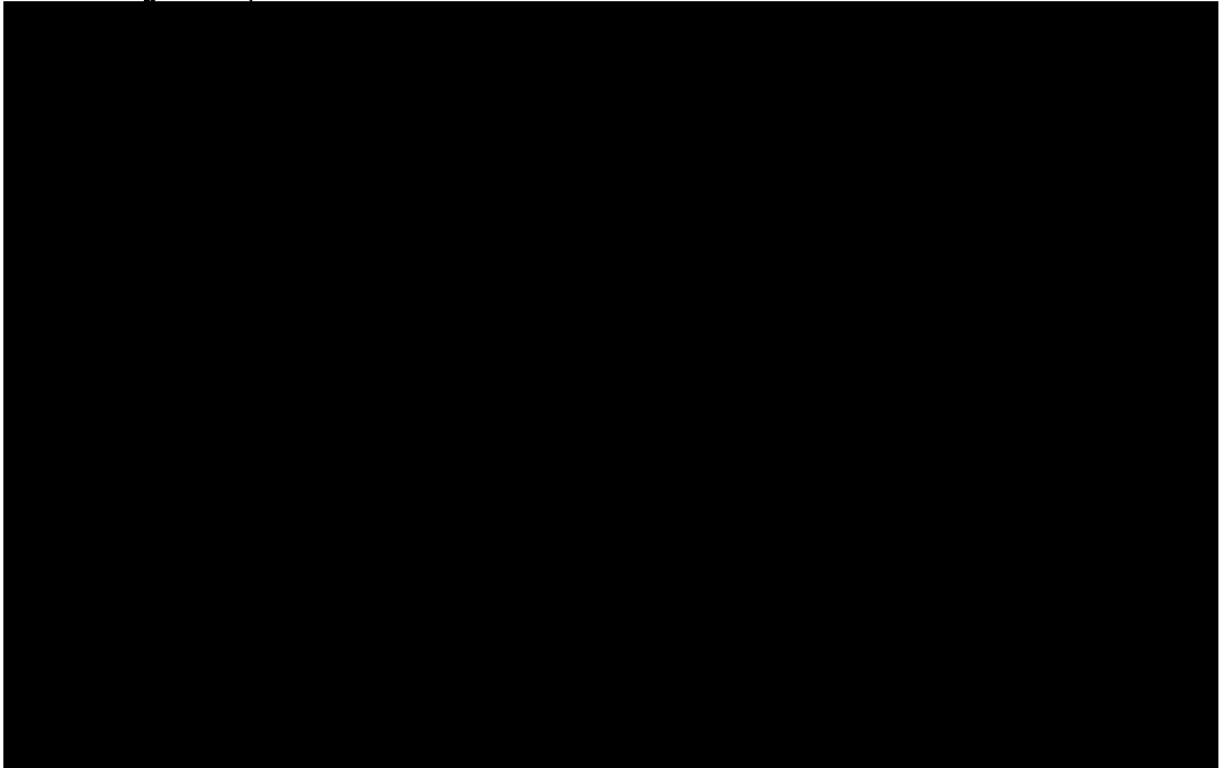

Cubans Release Three American Hijackers

During the past week the government of Cuba quietly returned three Americans wanted by the FBI on charges of aircraft hijacking. They are Gregory Alexander Graves, who hijacked a Delta Airlines jet on a flight from Atlanta to Savannah in 1971, and Carl and Norma White, who hijacked a National Airlines plane bound from Los Angeles to Tampa, Florida also in 1971. These are the first hijackers sent back to the United States by the Cuban government since it signed an agreement two years ago either to hold individuals who hijacked aircraft to Cuba or to return them to the United States to stand trial. The three returned via Barbados and San Juan, Puerto Rico, where they were taken into custody by the FBI. Graves will be tried in Georgia and the Whites in San Diego. (UNCLASSIFIED)

Terrorists Sentenced for 1974 Bomb Attacks Against U.S.
Installations in Beirut

Four defendants, charged with bombing the USIS Kennedy Cultural Center in Beirut on 28 May 1974 and attempting to bomb the Pan American offices on 2 August 1974, were sentenced to death by a Lebanese military court on 28 May, according to Beirut press reports. The sentences of three of the defendants were commuted to five years at hard labor. Four other defendants were acquitted for lack of evidence. (See the 5 June 1974 issue for a report on the Cultural Center bombing and the 7 August 1974 issue for a report on the Pan American bombing. Those attacks were claimed by the "Revolutionary Arab Youth Organization," believed to be synonymous or connected with the Shibbu gang, a Lebanese urban guerrilla group. 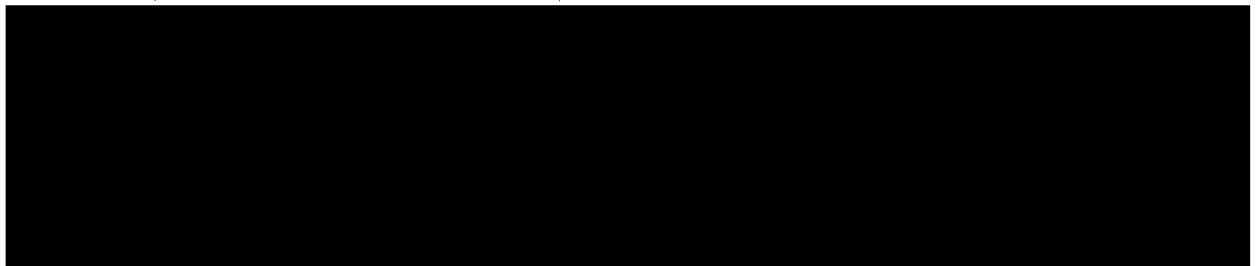


Mexican Communist Terrorist Leader Captured

On 6 June Demetrio Torralva Alvarez, the alleged leader of the 23rd of September Communist League (LCS), was captured by Mexican police. Torralva reportedly was involved in a bloody series of bank robberies which have resulted in the deaths of 15 policemen and 3 civilians since 10 December 1974. The LCS is probably the most highly organized terrorist group operating in Mexico and since its founding in the spring of 1973 has been involved in numerous robberies, murders and bombings in the central area of Mexico. The last LCS action directed against international targets occurred on 4 December 1974, when an LCS member attempted to abduct the French Consul General from the French Embassy in Mexico City. Bomb Explosion on Philippine Airlines Flight

Six U.S. citizens escaped serious injury when an explosion, apparently caused by a black powder bomb, blasted a hole in the rear of a Philippine Airlines (PAL) jet on 3 June. The aircraft was at 20,000 feet some 17 minutes from Manila, according to a PAL spokesman. Forty-five passengers were injured, of whom at least five required hospitalization after a successful emergency landing at the Manila International Airport, but none of the six Americans on the flight was seriously hurt. The blast produced a hole about four feet in diameter in the fuselage beside the right engine of the British-built twin-engined BAC-111. The bomb is thought to have been placed in one of the aircraft's rear lavatories. (UNCLASSIFIED)

Cuba Returns Another Hijacker Plus \$2 Million in Ransom

On 15 June Michael Lynn Hansen, who hijacked a Western Airlines jet to Cuba in 1972 to protest the U.S. bombing of North Vietnam, was returned to New York from Cuba via Barbados. Hansen faces charges of air piracy and failure to report for the military draft. Hansen is the fourth American hijacker to be returned to the United States from Cuba via Barbados in the past month (see the 3 June issue). In a further gesture of good will, the Cuban government also has agreed to return \$2 million in ransom which was paid to the hijackers who diverted a Southern Airways DC-9 to Cuba in November 1972. 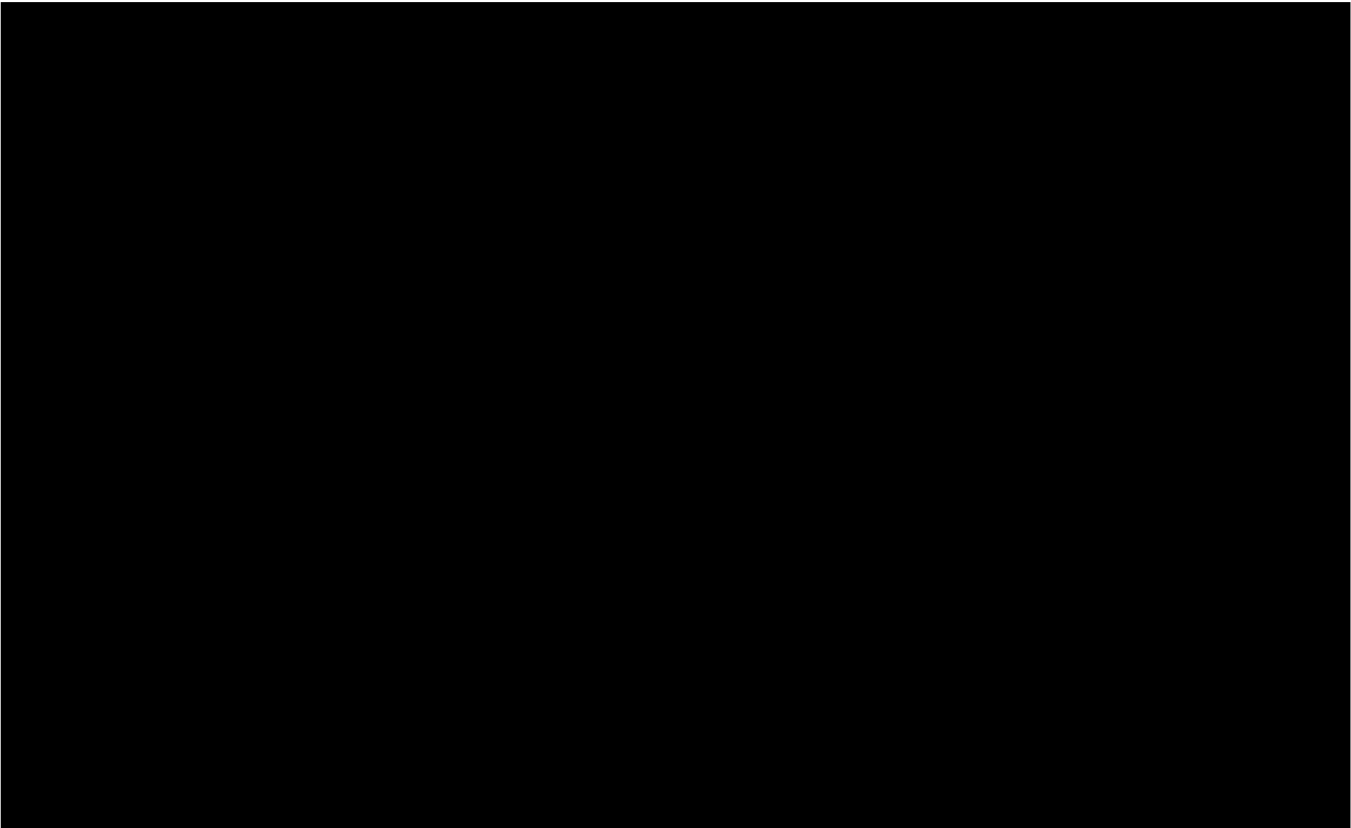

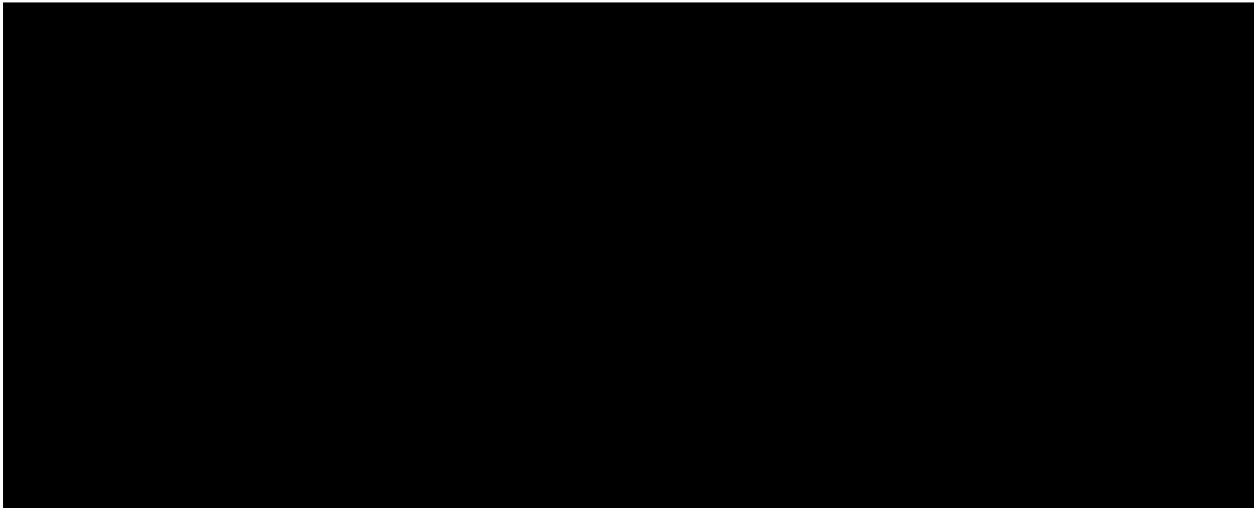

German Anarchists' Contact With PFLP in 1972

Members of the anarchist 2 June Movement, which was responsible for kidnapping West Berlin politician Peter Lorenz in February, met with a representative of the Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine in April 1972, according to recent information from West German security officials. The anarchists asked what kind of support the PFLP could provide to the 2 June Movement, such as false documentation and hide-outs for terrorists who wanted to disappear for long periods. The PFLP representative said the PFLP could hide German terrorists in Syria, Iraq or Lebanon for 6 to 12 months, at a cost of \$800 to \$1,200. He suggested that 2 June fugitives could also hide in Guatemala, where they would have to cover only the costs of their travel. The 2 June Movement also reportedly asked the PFLP to provide false passports, which were to cost approximately \$2,000. There is no evidence, however, that the 2 June Movement or other West German terrorist organizations have ever used documentation fabricated by the PFLP, or that their fugitives have taken refuge in the countries suggested by the PFLP. 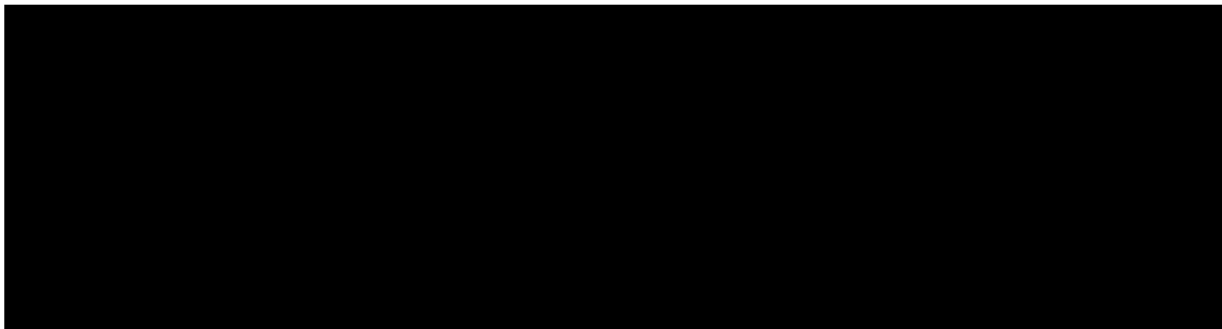
Six Japanese Red Army Members Reportedly in Portugal

Six Japanese Red Army terrorists were in Portugal as of early June, according to an unconfirmed report obtained by French security authorities. These six were JRA head Shigenobu Fusako and five other JRA members who participated in such past JRA operations as the September 1974 attack on the French Embassy at the The Hague and the February 1975 surveillance of the Lebanese Embassy in Stockholm. The ultimate destination of these JRA members is not known. The JRA members alleged to be in Portugal are the same six individuals for whom Japanese authorities have issued arrest warrants (see the issue of 20 May). 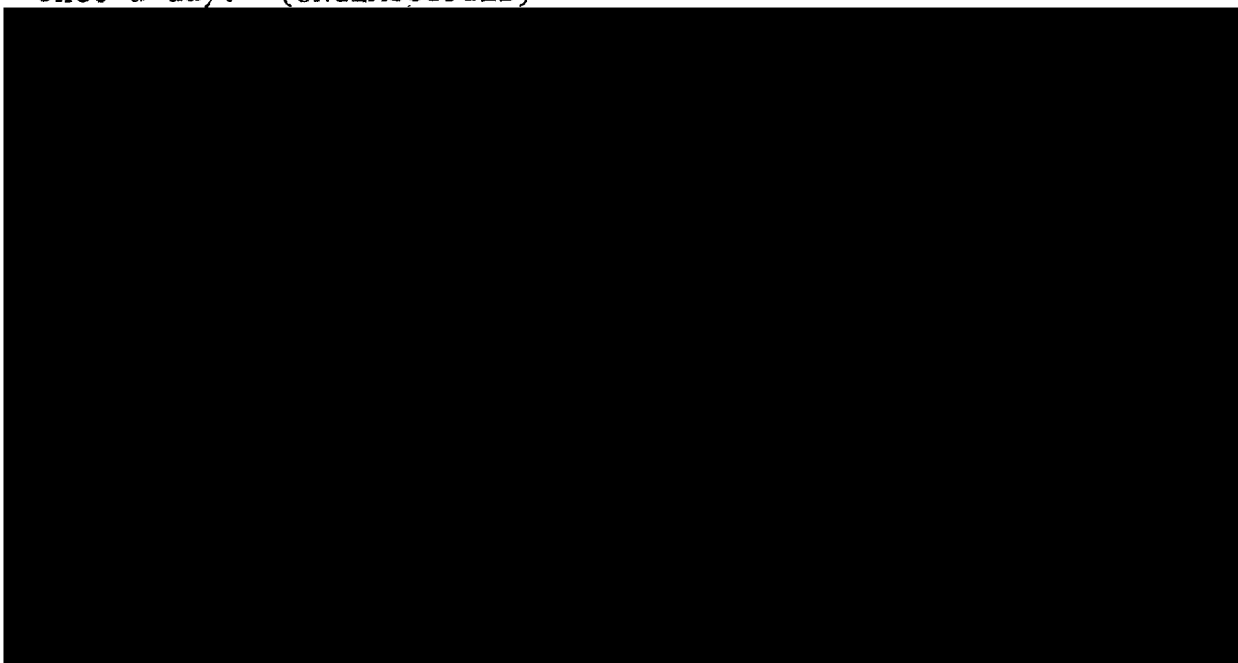

Terrorist Involved in Crowley Kidnapping Released by Dominican Authorities

On 19 June the Dominican government unconditionally released Rafael "Fafa" Taveras Rosario from prison, where he completed a five-year sentence for involvement in the March 1970 kidnapping of Donald J. Crowley, the U.S. Air Attache in the Dominican Republic. Taveras, who has been described as a leader of the moderate wing of the Dominican Popular Movement (MPD), thanked the press for its efforts on his behalf saying that press organs were largely responsible for his release. Taveras had previously rejected a conditional release which would have required him to report to the police once a day. (UNCLASSIFIED)

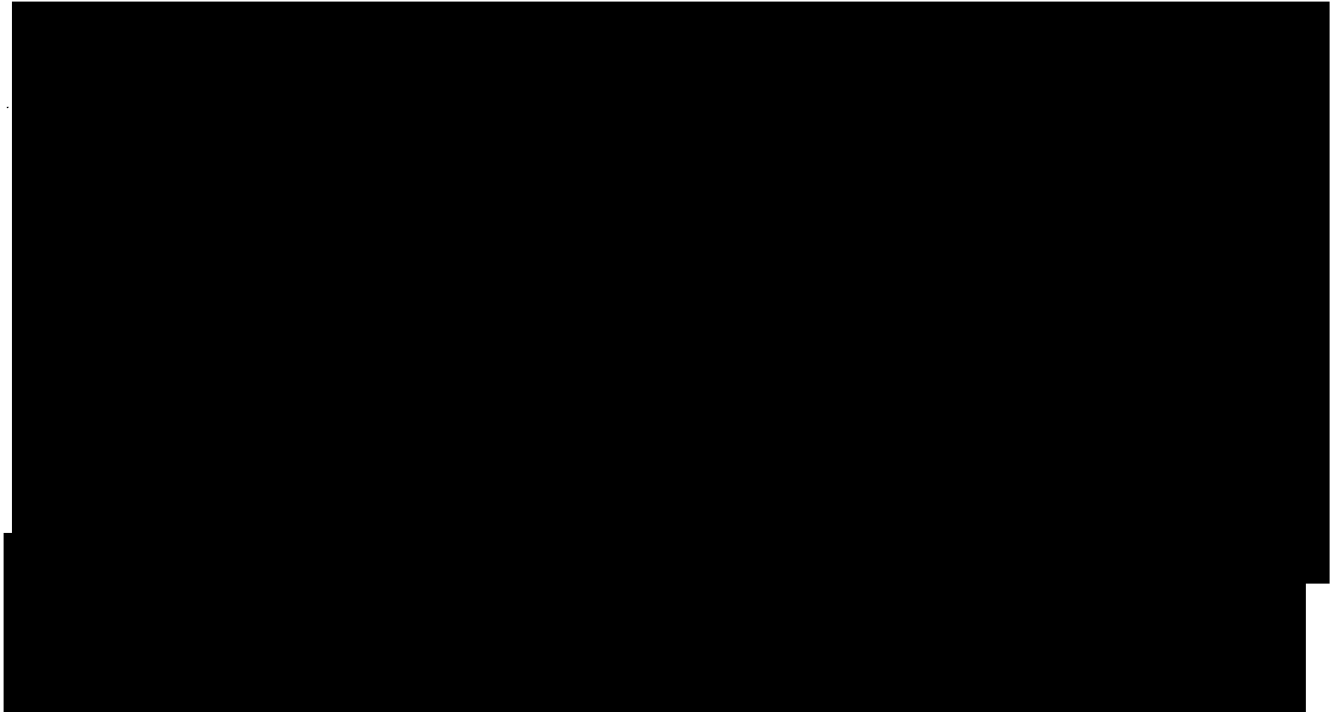

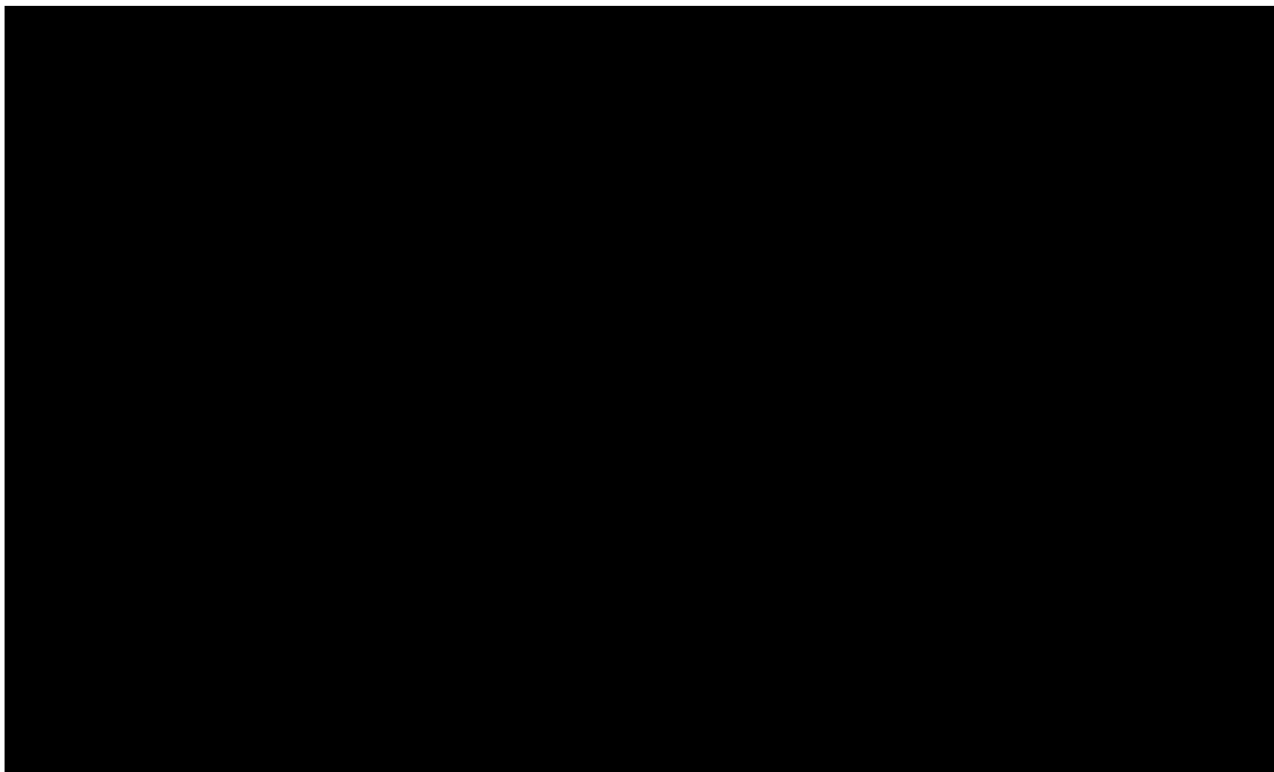

The informant, claiming the hijackers sought his help and the use of his passport, requested \$20,000 from PanAm in return for additional information. It is likely that the informant is fabricating this story in an attempt to obtain money. The FBI has been investigating and has not reached a conclusion. (UNCLASSIFIED)
