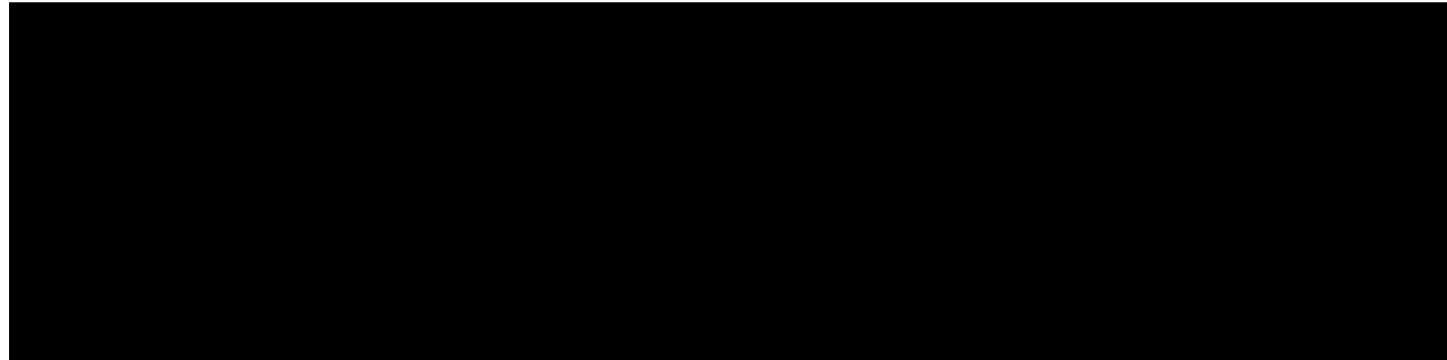

Attempted Hijacking of Philippine Air Lines Aircraft

A lone Filipino male attempted to hijack a Philippine Air Lines aircraft on a domestic flight en route from Davao to Manila the morning of 7 October. Armed with a pistol, a supply of ammunition and several grenades, the hijacker gained control of the plane with 70 people aboard shortly before its arrival at Manila International Airport and demanded that the plane be flown to Libya. Once on the ground, the plane was readied for an overseas flight. Of the countries on the flight plan, both Singapore and Bangkok refused landing permits for the commandeered aircraft. The exchange of many of the passengers for a Philippine Air Lines vice president and four stewardesses was negotiated. Several American citizens were among those exchanged. Eight hours after gaining control of the aircraft, Camilo Morales, about 23 years old, surrendered to Philippine authorities. Morales claimed that his daughter had been kidnapped last Friday, 3 October, by government central intelligence agents. He apparently is experiencing great mental stress because of his daughter's disappearance. (UNCLASSIFIED)

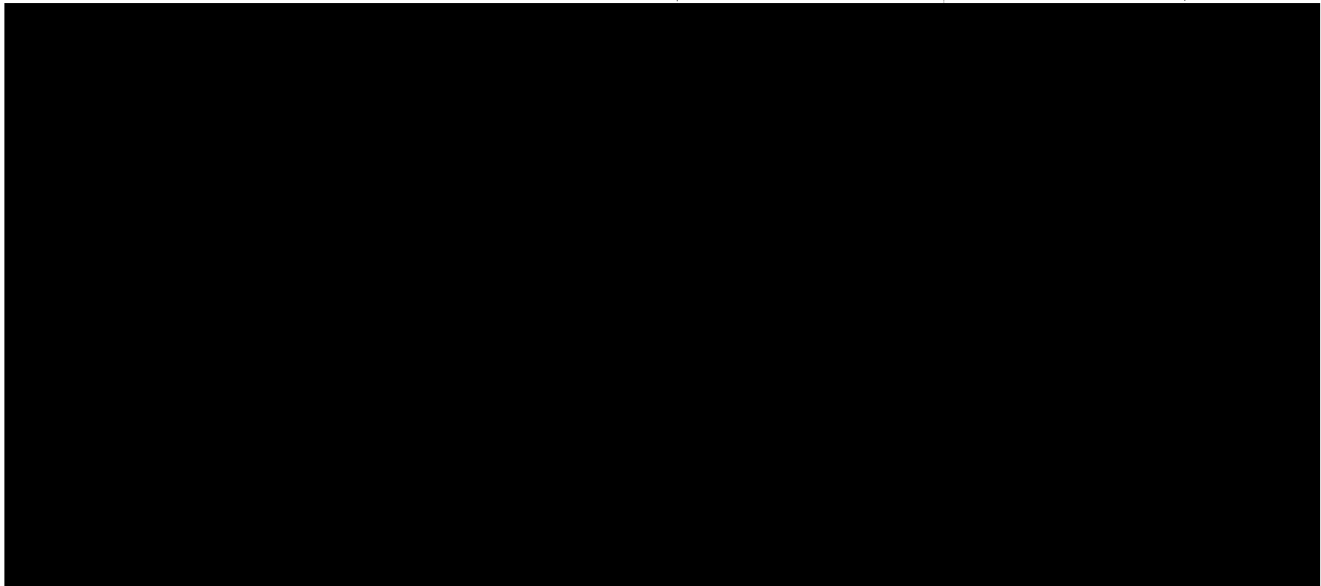

IRA Kidnapping of Dutch Businessman

Dr. T. Herrema, the Dutch managing director of a Dutch company near Limerick, Ireland, was kidnapped on 3 October just a few hundred yards from his home. IRA members telephoned a Dublin newspaper to relay their demands: Herrema would be shot within 48 hours unless Irish officials released three interned IRA members from prison. The three prisoners are Kevin Mallon, top Provisional IRA leader; Bridgett Rose Dugdale, who hijacked an art treasure in May 1974 valued at 6 million pounds in order to obtain the release of IRA leaders; and Jim Hyland, background unknown.

As of mid-afternoon on 6 October, there were few new developments. The last contact with the kidnappers was a call on 3 October to the Dutch Embassy with the same demands described above.

The government of Ireland is taking a strong stand against giving in to the demands of the kidnappers. Reaction throughout Ireland has been angry, as the affair might threaten jobs of Irish workers through reluctance of foreign firms to invest in Ireland. (UNCLASSIFIED)

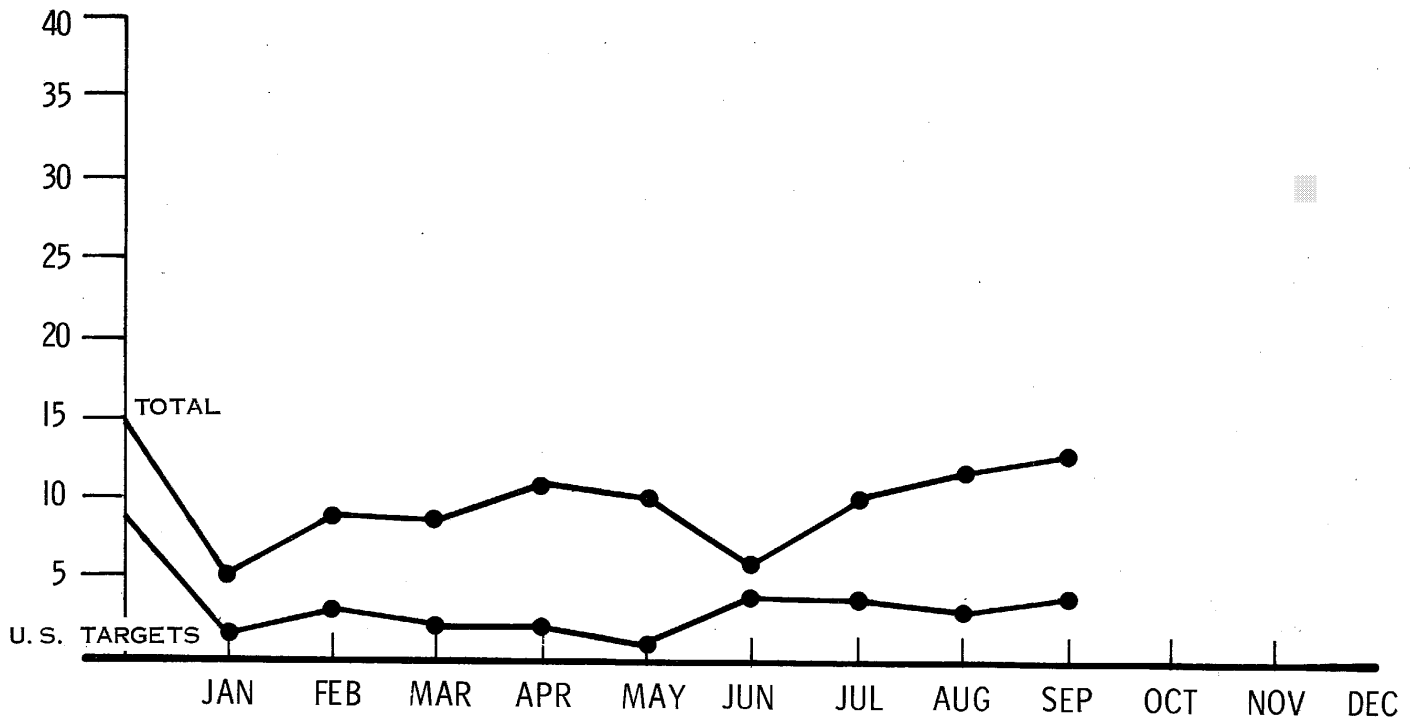

Date: 3 October 1975 Dutch Businessman Kidnapped in Ireland
Place: Ireland, Limerick A Dutch businessman was kidnapped on 3 October outside his home near Limerick. A telephone caller to a Dublin newspaper threatened that the Dutch national would be shot within 48 hours unless three IRA members were released from prison. The government of Ireland refuses to meet these demands. (See Notes.) (UNCLASSIFIED)

Date: 4 October 1975 Beirut Airport Attacked
Place: Lebanon, Beirut Four Arab terrorists attacked the Beirut airport on 4 October in an apparent attempt to hijack an aircraft and take Egyptian passengers hostage in order to protest the recent Egyptian-Israeli Sinai accord. Three people were killed, including one of the terrorists. Fourteen people were wounded. The other three terrorists are in custody. Their identities and organization have not yet been ascertained. (See Articles.) (UNCLASSIFIED)



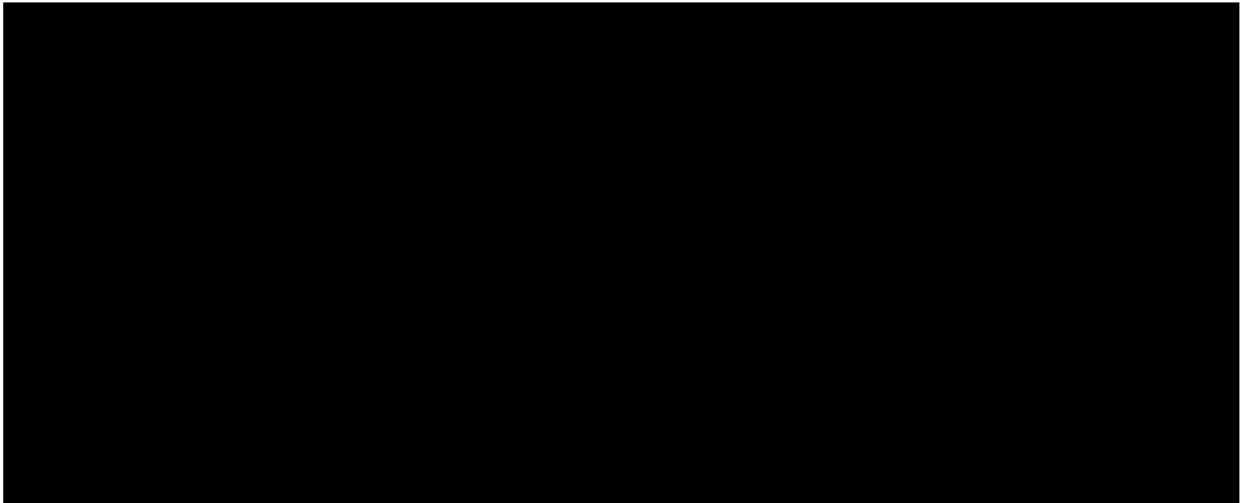

Mrs. Claustre Still Detained in Chad Though Ransom Paid

Mrs. Claustre, the French archeologist held by Toubou tribe insurgents for the last 18 months, has yet to be released, even though the French government has paid a ransom of both money and non-military supplies to the rebels in northern Chad. (See the 16 September issue, page 8.) The French are calling on the International Red Cross to aid in negotiating Mrs. Claustre's release. The government of Chad claims Mrs. Claustre is a hostage, not a prisoner of war, and thus is opposed to having the Red Cross involved. (Comment: The rebels had demanded military equipment as part of the ransom, which France apparently did not supply. This fact probably is responsible for the present impasse.) (UNCLASSIFIED)

<u>Place:</u>	United States, Miami	An explosive device detonated at the Dominican Republic Consulate in Miami on 6 October. No one was injured; extensive property damage resulted. A telephone caller to a Miami newspaper said a group called the "Youths of the Star" had placed the bomb. This is probably a code name used by the FLNC, an anti-Castro Cuban exile group that has claimed credit for numerous bombings. This particular bombing may be related to the fact that the Dominican Republic extradited to the U.S. a Cuban exile wanted as a federal fugitive. (See the 7 October issue.) (UNCLASSIFIED)
<u>Date:</u>	8 October 1975	<u>Spanish Diplomat Wounded</u>
<u>Place:</u>	France, Paris	A Spanish Assistant Military Attache in Paris was shot several times and seriously wounded on 8 October. The attackers escaped. A group using the name of one of the recently executed Basque terrorists claimed responsibility for the shooting by issuing a statement in a leftwing Paris newspaper. (UNCLASSIFIED)

Spanish Consulate Bombed

The Spanish Consulate in Mainz, West Germany was bombed on 8 October. No one was injured, although there was extensive damage. Police believe political leftists are responsible; however no group has claimed credit for this bombing. This probably is another instance of reaction against Spain's execution of convicted terrorists. (See the 30 September issue, page 1.) (UNCLASSIFIED)

Chilean Refugees Seize U.N.
Office

A group of 16 Chileans and one Brazilian seized the office of the United Nations High Commission for Refugees in Buenos Aires on 8 October. Fourteen Argentine employees were held hostage. The group said it wanted to draw world attention to the way Latin refugees are being treated. On 10 October they and their families left for Algeria, which agreed to give them asylum, and the hostages were released. (See Articles.) (UNCLASSIFIED)

Shortly before midnight on 12 October two improvised explosive devices were detonated near U.S.-occupied buildings

in Ankara, causing property damage but no injuries. One device was thrown from a passing car into the parking lot of a building occupied by the U.S. Base Civil Engineer Detachment. The second explosion occurred at the Ankara Officers Club. It is not known who is responsible for these explosions. (UNCLASSIFIED)

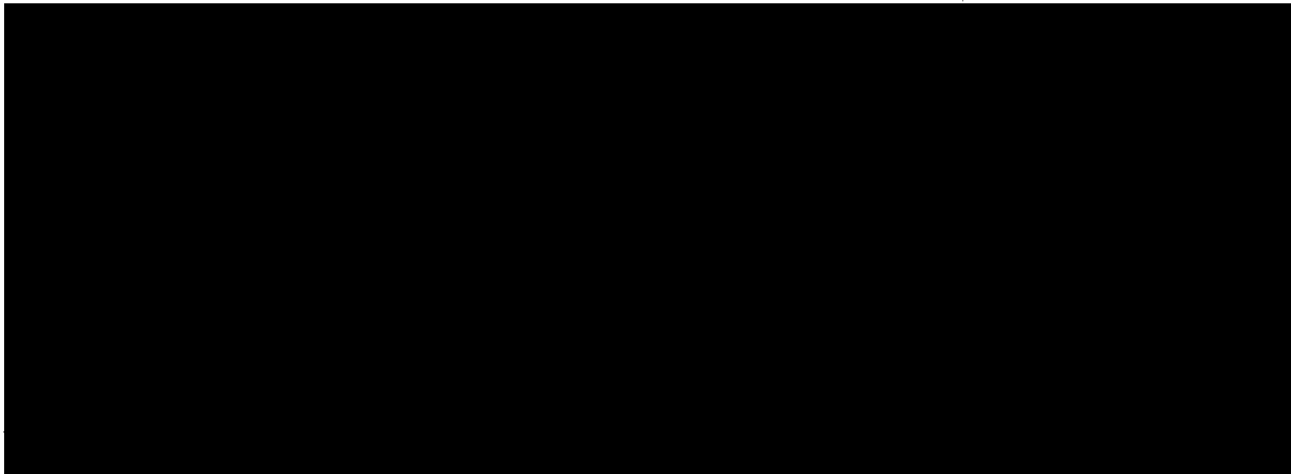

Target: Spanish Consulate ** The Spanish Consulate has received several threatening calls, according to the U.S. Consulate in Cali. Several instances of surveillance have also been noted. One caller made an extortion threat against the Vice Consul, which may indicate that ordinary criminals are involved rather than a political group. Spanish interests have been the target of numerous terrorist acts since the execution of five terrorists in Spain recently. The Spanish consular offices are located close to those of the U.S., and a terrorist attack could create a security problem for the U.S. offices as well. (UNCLASSIFIED)

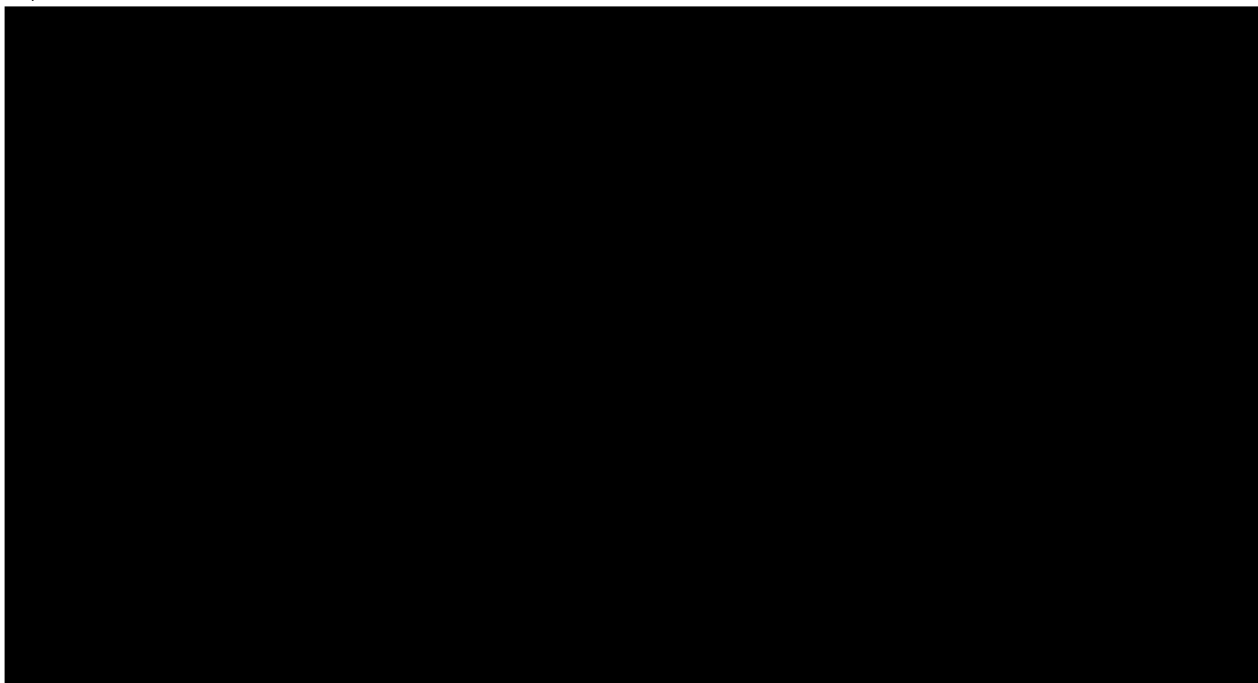

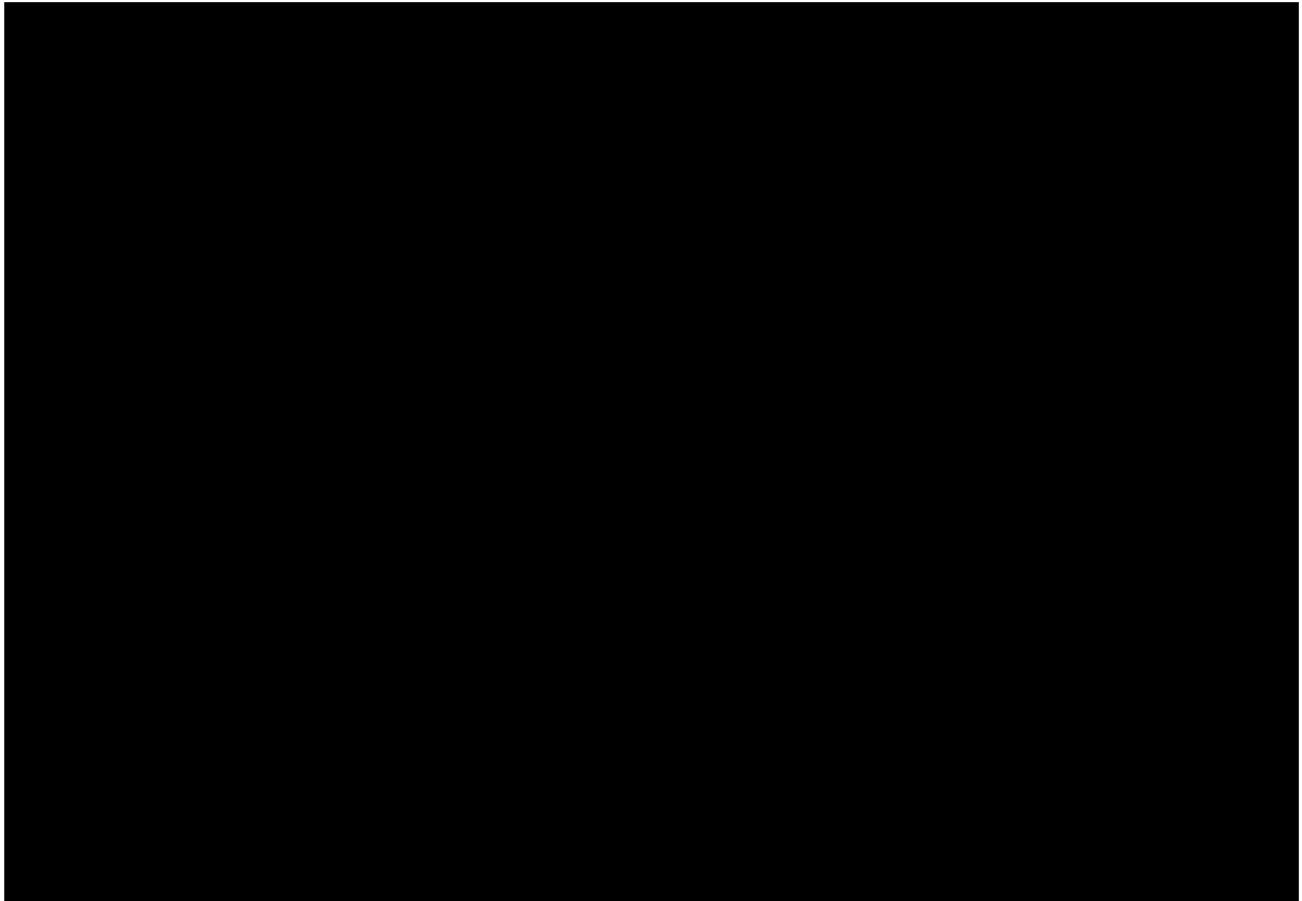

Irish Police Storm House Where Kidnappers Have Dutch
Businessman

On 21 October Irish police stormed the house where kid-
nappers are holding Tiede Herrema, the Dutch businessman they
have held since 3 October. (See the 7 October issue.) Accord-
ing to the 21 October press, police were occupying the ground
floor of the house and negotiating with the captors, a man and
a woman believed to be Irish Republican Army renegades Eddie
Gallagher and Marian Coyle, who had Herrema at gunpoint on the
second floor. The kidnappers were still demanding the release
of three IRA members located at the maximum security jail 13
miles from the house. Gallagher claimed he had tied explosives
to himself and would blow up the house if security forces tried
to rescue Herrema. The final outcome is unknown at this time.

Kidnappings Continue in Argentina

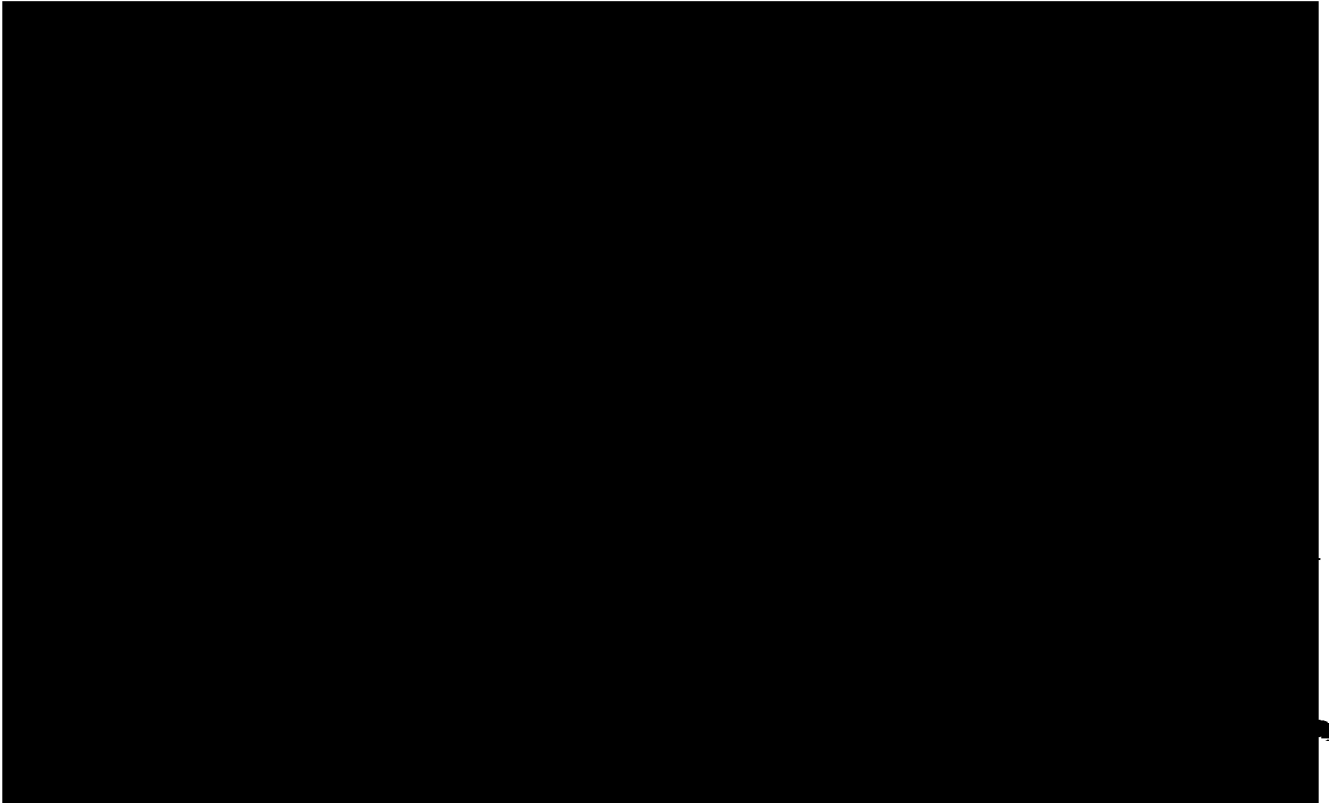
The Montoneros have claimed responsibility for the kidnapping of Franz Metz, the West German production manager of the Mercedes-Benz truck factory in Buenos Aires, where 4,000 workers have been on strike for the past three weeks. A communique from the Montoneros stated that Metz will be held hostage until Mercedes-Benz rehires 119 workers who were dismissed and recognizes the leaders of the strike as the workers' representatives. Metz has not been seen since he left work on Friday, 24 October.

Elsewhere in Argentina, Noel Salomon, a visiting literature professor from France, managed to flee when a group of armed men burst into his home in Mendoza, Argentina on 22 October. Salomon, who was unharmed, teaches at the University of Cuyo in Mendoza on a cultural exchange program. The identity of the terrorists is unknown. (UNCLASSIFIED)

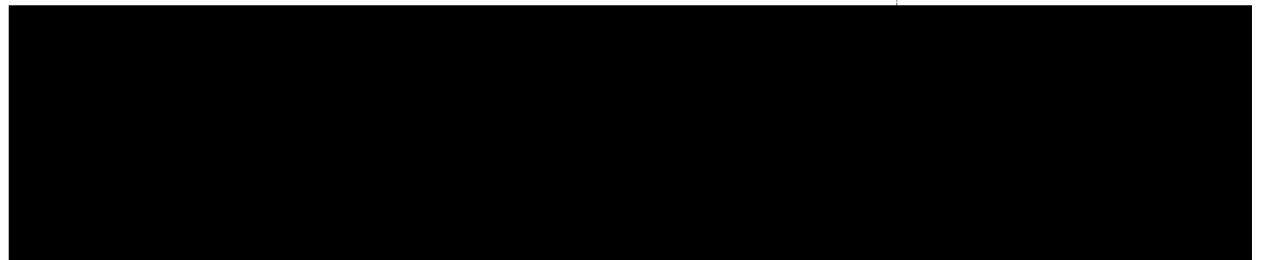

More Bombs Discovered in Miami

On 20 October a bomb was discovered at the Dominican Airlines office in Miami, Florida. The bomb, which contained six pounds of dynamite, failed to detonate because of a faulty timing mechanism. The attempted bombing is believed to be the work of the Cuban National Liberation Front (FLNC) and is the fourth bombing incident in south Florida since the arrest of Humberto Lopez, the titular head of the FLNC who was deported from the Dominican Republic on 30 September. 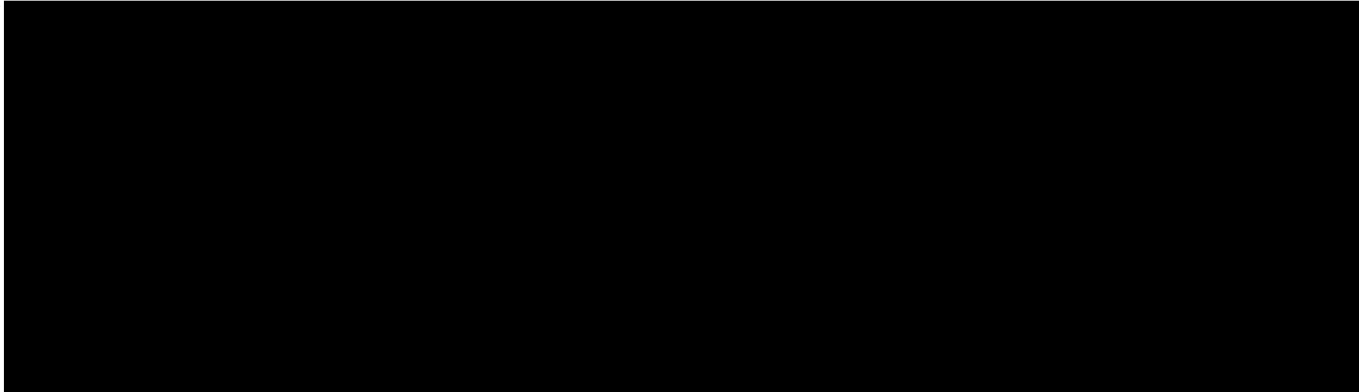

Jewish Defense League Possibly Involved in State Department Bombing

Although a radical Puerto Rican group is believed responsible for most of the bomb explosions that occurred on 27 October in New York, Chicago and Washington, a spokesman for the Jewish Defense League said the explosion at the State Department was to protest the current visit to the U.S. of Egyptian President Anwar Sadat and the "sellout of Israel to Sadat." According to a Washington Star story, however, the JDL spokesman "for legal reasons" stopped short of explicitly claiming that the JDL was responsible for the bombing. The bomb, a small black powder device, blew a hole in a retaining wall, shattered several plate glass doors, and blew out numerous windows on the first three floors. Damage was estimated at \$15,000. The explosion occurred at about 2:00 a.m., and no one was injured. (UNCLASSIFIED)

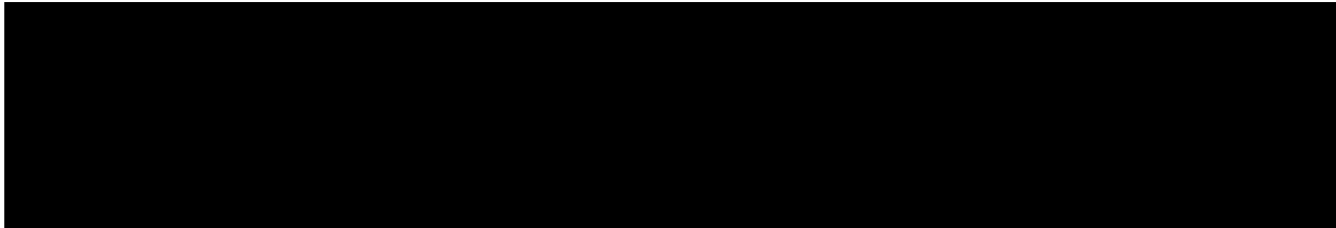

CHRONOLOGY OF SIGNIFICANT INTERNATIONAL TERRORIST ACTS

Date: 22 October 1975 Two USIA Employees Kidnapped
Place: Lebanon, Beirut Two employees of the USIA Regional Service Center in Beirut were kidnapped by unknown assailants on 22 October. No one has claimed responsibility for the kidnapping and no demands have been made as yet. (UNCLASSIFIED)

Date: 22 October 1975 Two Turkish Ambassadors Assassinated
24 October 1975
Place: Austria, Vienna The Turkish Ambassador in Vienna was shot to death in his office by three gunmen on 22 October. An anonymous caller to the Turkish Consulate General in New York claimed the Armenian Liberation Front was responsible for the murder. The Turkish Ambassador in Paris and his chauffeur were shot to death in their car by two or three gunmen on 24 October. An anonymous caller to a French newspaper claimed the Armenian Liberation Front was responsible. However, it is not considered certain that Armenians did in fact carry out the assassinations. (See Articles.) (UNCLASSIFIED)

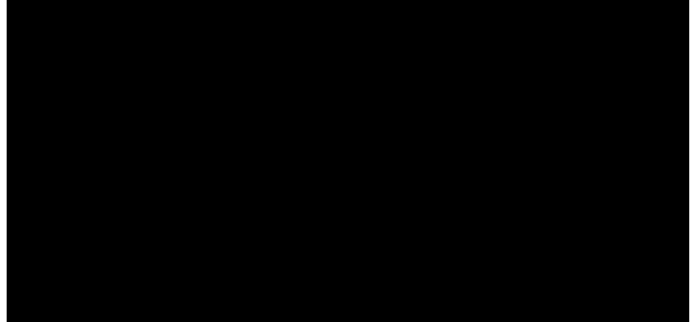

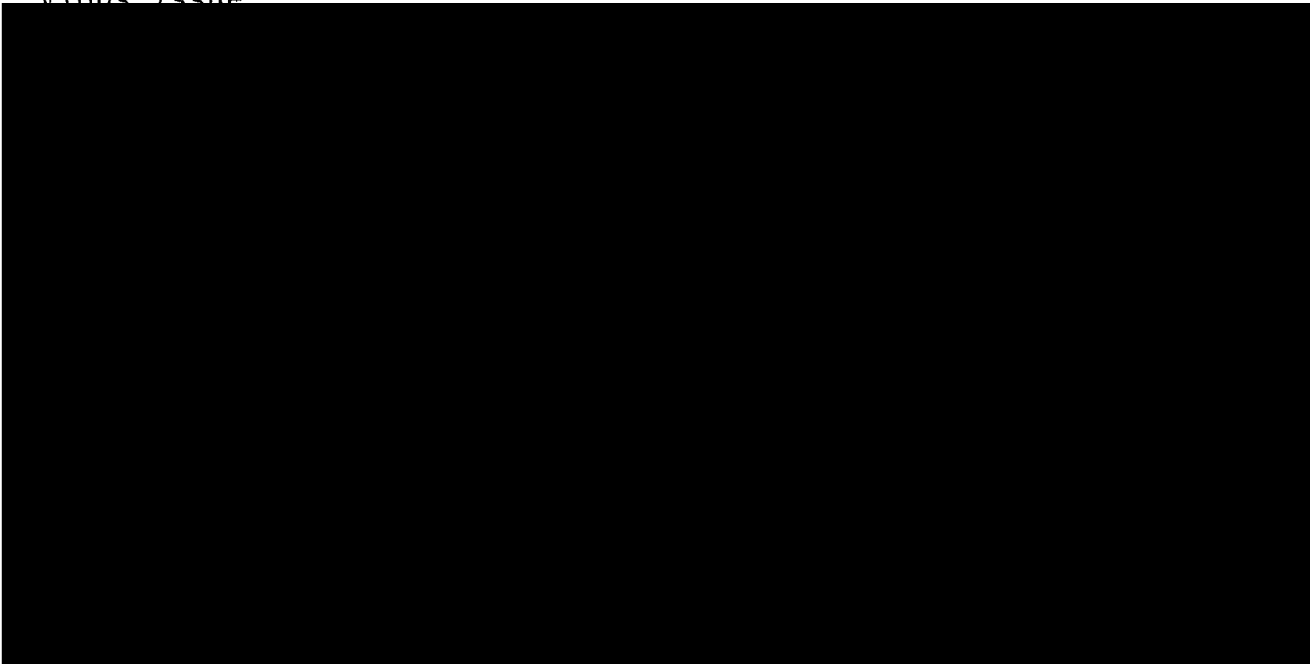
