MEMORANDUM

SUBJECT: Communist and Radical Leftist Influence in the Armed Forces of Western Europe

## Summary

A review of available evidence on the activities of West European Communist parties and radical leftist groups\* indicates that -- except in Portugal -- they have little, if any, influence among the armed forces. Portugal is a special case; its experience over the past year is not likely to be repeated elsewhere in Western Europe. Indeed, the recent events in Portugal are likely to lead to increased vigilance on the part of its neighbors, lest their armed forces become similarly "infected."

This is not to say that the European left has been powerless to influence public attitudes that tend to weaken the military. Radical leftist groups have had some success in their attempts to exploit growing anti-military sentiment in Western Europe and to foster the notion that strong military forces are an anachronism in the era of detente.
