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
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

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Dulles' Important News

WASHINGTON

The Secretary of State said in a television speech here that American leaders in Europe believed the Soviet Union could not overturn the Continent without first reinforcing the Red armies in or near East Germany.

"This they could not do without our knowledge and this fact alone is of great importance," Dulles added in a report of the meeting of the N.A.T.O. Council in Paris last week.

Dulles said that this opinion of Soviet strength and expansion in Europe was expressed to him by General Matthew B. Ridgway, Allied Supreme Commander, and his Chief of Staff, General Alfred Gruenthal. — (Reuter)

General Peron then said that the Government had been able to have a good year, even though the country had suffered a severe drought. He said that after consecutive years of bad harvests, the country had now begun to overcome them, and added that at present there was no serious lack of foodstuffs. He also declared that we had been very lucky in face of the severe drought which had hit the country, adding that the rains having come in time had saved us from a famine. He said that the country would have to depend even more on imports.

Trade Union Action Praised

General Peron then said that International News Service was busy in spreading lying rumors to the effect that the international crisis was advancing uncontrollably towards Argentina, and that the only measure preventable they have adopted is to declare that there will be no economic crisis, as the press could be misled by declarations. Belgium.

De Arteaga, aged 56, gave
his address as the Observatory,
Brussels.

The prosecuting counsel
described the case as a
simple and straightforward
one of attempting to ammu-
nition diamonds out of the
country.

The Uruguayan Foreign
Office had already suspended
de Arteaga from his post
pending the hearing of the
charge. He was also accredited
to Luxembourg.

De Arteaga pleaded guilty
in the Dover court to two
offences against British Crim-
e and Customs Laws.

There were that on April 10 he was knowingly con-
cerned with an unlined ex-
amination of two packages of
British diamonds with intent
to evade export prohibitions
under new separate British
trade orders.

The charges were dealt
with by the court and it was not
alleged that he had committed
more than one offence.



U.S. Britain Talk Debts

London

"We have now proposed, and the government of Brazil have agreed, that formal discussions should open in Rio de Janeiro as soon as possible. We expect them to begin in the second half of May."

U.S. DOLLAR AID

The Export-Import Bank yesterday loaned Brazil \$300,000,000. The money will be used to liquidate Brazil's dollar obligations to U.S. exporters.

At the same time the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development loaned Brazil \$300,000,000 to finance a highway programme intended to develop the important agricultural and industrial state of Rio de Janeiro.—(Reuters)
