SOUTH America desires to unite, as it is authorized to do, and as the States of Central America and of Western Europe are already doing, yet the disruptive forces of capitalism organize an insidious campaign of calumnies aimed particularly at the Chilean-Argentine conflict," said General Perón at his speech when inaugurating the 55th ordinary session of Congress yesterday morning.

He also asked for a special, total and urgent congressional investigation, as well as exemplary investigations for the United Press, Associated Press and International News services for their campaign of international detestation.

The President of the Argentine Republic, General Perón, addressed the Chamber of Deputies in a crowded hall, which, because of the absence of both Chambers of Congress, could be seen by thousands of members of the Argentine press, and by the members of the Argentine military and police forces, and by the Argentine press leaders.

General Perón started speaking exactly at 8:30 o'clock and at 8:50, three minutes later, a bomb was heard to explode. This, however, did not interrupt the President's discourse nor did it prevent the course of the meeting. Later the explosion was believed to have taken place at Plaza IX, in a house being repaired.

The President spoke for 10 hours, with a break for a 15-minute lunch at 1:30 p.m. His message was read by the President's secretary, General Perón.

MOSCOW — The Minister of Defense, Marshal Nikolai Bulganin, told the public assembled in Red Square in Moscow for the celebration of May Day that the Soviet Union must strengthen their armed forces because so far the Western powers have done nothing to diminish world tension.

Demanding deeds and not words from the West, Bulganin added: "The Soviet government will welcome any step by the government of other countries genuinely aimed at easing international tension and would like to see the peace full statements made by the leaders of those governments supported by acts."

Russia's traditional military parade through the banner-decked square, was only half of its usual length. Among the Red streamers and huge portraits of the leaders, were many white-lettered slogans calling for peace and friendship among the east Labour Day since before the war.

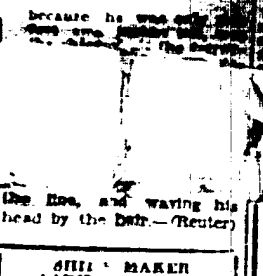

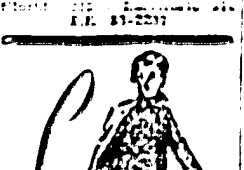

Dulles' Important News

WASHINGTON — The Secretary of State said in a television speech here that American leaders in Europe believed the Soviet Union could not overturn the Continent without first defeating the Red armies in or near East Germany.

"This they could not do without our knowledge and this fact alone is of great importance," Dulles added in a report of the meeting of the N.A.T.O. Council in Paris last week.

Dulles said that this opinion of Soviet strength and capabilities in Europe was expressed to him by General Matthew B. Ridgway, Allied Supreme Commander, and by Chief of Staff, General Alfred Guenther. — (Reuters)

INDIA WILL KEEP OUT OF WAR

Brazil, Britain To Talk Debts

LONDON — Brazil and Britain have agreed to start formal discussions in Rio de Janeiro as soon as possible on Brazil's \$200,000,000 trade indebtedness to this country. Mr. Peter Thornycroft, President of the Board of Trade, announced this in the House of Commons being asked whether he could yet make a statement on Brazil's indebtedness to Britain.

The British government have been exchanging views with the government of Brazil on this subject for some time. Thornycroft said: "We have now proposed, and the government of Brazil have agreed, that formal discussions should open in Rio de Janeiro as soon as possible. We expect them to begin in the second half of May." — (Reuters)

U.S. DOLLAR AID Washington — The Export-Import Bank yesterday loaned Brazil \$200,000,000. The money will be used to liquidate Brazil's dollar obligations to U.S. exporters. At the same time the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development loaned Brazil \$300,000,000 to finance a highway programme intended to develop the important agricultural and industrial state of Rio de Janeiro. — (Reuters)

A MILITARY PARADE

MOSCOW
THE Minister of Defence, Marshal Nicolai Bulganin told the public assembled in Red Square in Moscow for the celebration of May Day that the Soviet Union must strengthen their armed forces because so far the Western powers have done nothing to diminish world tension.

Demanding deeds and not words from the West, Bulganin added:
"The Soviet government will welcome any step by the governments of other countries genuinely aimed at easing international tension and would like to see the peaceful statements made by the leaders of those governments supported by acts."

Russia's traditional military parade through the banner-decked square, was only half of its usual length. Among the Red streamers and huge portraits of the leaders, were many white-lettered slogans calling for peace and friendship among the peoples.

Russia, Bulganin, declared, was now in the plenitude of its strength, and would continue to show appropriate concern for its security as long as the Western rearmaments race was not checked and the wide net of military bases scattered on the territories of many states of Europe and Asia, particularly on the territories bordering the Soviet Union, was not wound up. — (Reuter and U.P.)

The communique said that three members of his body-guard, including one woman, surrendered after killing him, by stopping a passenger train standing beside the line, and waving its head by the hair. — (Reuter)

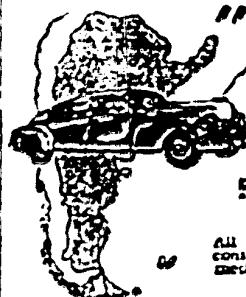

Sr. Eduardo de Arcego, former Uruguayan Minister to Belgium, was fined \$5000 yesterday for attempting to export diamonds valued at \$13,750. Mr. Martin Morris, de Arcego's Counsel, said a telegram had been received early yesterday from Uruguay stating that the National Council had demanded de Arcego's services as a diplomatic agent and as Minister Plenipotentiary to Belgium.

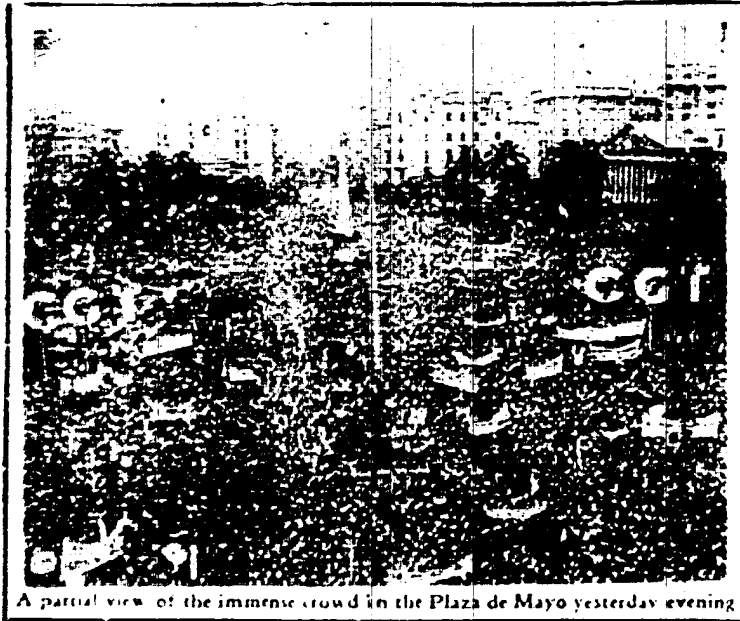

BRITAIN "NON-ESSENTIAL" IMPORTS FOR ARGENTINA

LONDON
BRITISH textile manufacturers were disappointed but not surprised at the announcement by Mr. H. R. Mackintosh, Secretary for Overseas Trade, that Argentina would not buy British textiles under the existing trade agreement.

NEWS IN BRIEF

SHIP — The British ship "Hull" departed for Buenos Aires on the 14th of the U.N. Commerce Control Act. It is carrying a cargo of goods for the Government of Argentina. The ship is expected to arrive in Buenos Aires on the 17th.

NO COLLECTORS — The U.S. Customs Service has announced that it will not collect duties on certain goods imported from Argentina.

TORNADOES — A severe tornado struck the town of Mar del Plata on the 13th, causing considerable damage to property and loss of life.

MR. EDEN — Mr. Neville Chamberlain, British Prime Minister, is expected to visit Buenos Aires on the 18th.

EXPLAINED — The Argentine Government has explained its policy regarding the importation of British goods.

Mr. Mackintosh stated that in the existing trade agreement, Argentina has agreed to buy goods worth £2,000,000 worth of Argentine goods which are not essential to the life of the country. This includes office machinery, cameras and photographic materials, hand tools, light aircraft, and sports goods. In addition, various foods are mentioned such as dried cod and herrings, whisky and tea.
