		both east and west, each cart led by a CCF soldier.		
25X1		an estimated one-battalion strength of CCF were stationed in Och on-ni (CT-7253). Some were quartered in about 20 damaged civilian houses, the others were living in trenches and bunkers in the area. Parked west of the houses was a large, 10-wheeled truck with a trailer about the size of a US jeep trailer. The truck resembled a ZIS-151, 6 x 6, cargo truck except that the cab windows were more round. The bed of the truck was covered with metal. It resembled an ambulance with two doors at the back. On the trailer was, apparently, a generator, from which two large electric cables ran through one of the rear truck doors. About 100 yards from the truck were forty 50-gallon fuel drums. Two or three jeeps and three GAZ-51, 4 x 2, cargo trucks were moving about in the area from time to time. 2		
25X1	6.	three tanks were going south from the Kumsong area through CT-735500, at an estimated speed of more than 30 miles per hour. The tanks resembled a Type 25-94 (Japanese) medium tank. They did not resemble a T-34. They were equipped with two turret-mounted guns. The upper gun was about two yards long, the other about one yard. Both were an estimated 80 to 86-mm. caliber. 3 On the front of the tanks were four lights in pairs, the larger of each pair on top. On each side of the top turret and above the heavy guns was one machine gun. One of the heavy guns had a muzzle break.  and nine GAZ-51 trucks was at CT-735500 moving north from Kumsong at a speed of 30 to 35 miles per hour. The vehicles were loaded with CCF troops.  in the area of CT-735500 about 40 CCF troops were working on the road. They were split into small groups and worked with picks and shovels in a desultory, undisciplined		
25X1		manner. In 16 January in the area near CT-748446 explosions and the sound of picks and shovels being used could be heard. North of the demilitarized zone explosions could be heard both day and night.		
	7.	The CCF troops observed d wore quilted uniforms which closely resembled the North Korean army uniform except the the CCF uniform had a collar. They wore fur hats. They had neither shoulder patches nor visible hat insignia. All those who were not on working parties were armed with long rifles which closely 25X1 resembled the Mossin-Nagant (Soviet), 7.62-mm. carbine, M-1938.
