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4. [redacted] following information on coal imports from Poland: Hard coal shipments from Poland arrive in East Germany via the border stations of Kuestrin-Kietz (for the Berlin area), Forst (for the Halle area), Guben (where most of the coal is transloaded to water to be forwarded via Fuerstenberg), and Horka (for the Dresden-Erfurt area). The shipments arrive at irregular intervals. Some coal shipments also arrive at Stettin and Warnemuende to be forwarded to the Schwerin area. Coal deliveries started in the fall of 1953, it was planned to deliver the coal by water. However, this plan could not be carried out.

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1. [redacted] Comment. [redacted] Coal stocks which had been rising slowly prior to late December, are again declining, apparently because of insufficient deliveries from Poland.

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2. [redacted] Comment. Expressed in briquette units, coal stocks available on 8 January amounted to 141,900 tons of hard coal plus 19,900 tons of brown coal briquettes, i.e. a total of 161,800 tons.

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[redacted] According to the daily coal consumption quota of 25,000 tons fixed for December (the quota for January is not yet known), total coal stocks on 8 January represented 6.4 days' requirements which indicates that coal stocks continued to decrease.

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3. [redacted] Comment. The border stations mentioned were reported previously in connection with coal delivered.

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
