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- 2. All shipping at the port of Batum apparently docks at the Fetroleum Marbor as the Cabotage Harbor, noted on the chart, is of extremely shallow depth and no vessels were noted in this area. The weather was clear and with an average temperature of 80-90 degrees. No wrecks or construction were noted in the Fetroleum Marbor. Prevailing winds at the time were from the southwest and were mild. at times southwesterly and northwesterly winds are so heavy that difficulty in berthing ships is experienced and at times due to swells in the harbor, it is necessary that the vessels move out from the docks. No extreme tidal changes were noted.

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- 3. The docks in the Petroleum Harbor appeared to be in usable condition, built of concrete, and, as previously mentioned, with abutting wooden piers which kept vessels approximately 50 feet from the dock proper. All docks were well-lighted electrically and there appeared to be adequate supplies of water, coal and oil in the harbor. Pipelines take up most of the space of the docks on the north and east of Petroleum Harbor.

4.	On the general cargo dock, on the south side of Fetroleum Marbor, two eight	-ton steam
	portable cranes, with approximately a 50-foot reach, were noted. These cran	res appeared
	to be old but still serviceable. No other cranes were noted on any of the	other decks
	nor were any floating cranes noted in the harbor.	

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
