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

The period of unrest, of growing opposition to Castro. is now at a climax. The gestation of a revolution is at present at its most favorable time. The next few months should be ideal for the overthrow of the anarchickal regime that now disgraces our nation, but if the usurpers cannot be overcome within the next relatively short lapse of time, our common cause may be hopelessly lost, for:

(1) The morale of the Cuban People in the island, now at a

fighting pitch, is are to crumble from the gigantic strain.

(2) Castro would have the time to really dig in as a true military dictator, once he has thrown aside his last clock of hipocrisy. and with the help of the Communist block be exceedingly hard to

budge, thus making necessary a long war-like revolution.
(3) A long war would prove too costly for the already impoverished Cuban exiles and patriots, who have already lost all they had.

(4) The Cuben children, now being indectrinated, would grow up as Communists, through a long war.

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(5) The assistance so badly needed from the United States might not be available from a Republican administration, for the Cuban defeat should be instrumental in the loss of the 1962 and 1964 elections for the Democratic party, long been regarded as the most understanding towards Cuba and Latin America of the two. The loss of prestige for the US would bring about more Castroite regimes in South America, following the pattern of non-chastased Cuba. The liberties of the entire Hemisphere, and of the whole World, would then surely be inngrave danger, if not lost at all.

There is but one way to bring about complete harmony to our common cause, so as to convert all of the factions into one formidable force: To have one person unite the groups into one solid coalition, which must be based upon firm foundations of truth and mutual respect. This person must be devoid of preference for any particular faction, but must be imbued of the spirit of Democracy and Panamericanism, concepts apparently forgotten in Latin America since the Second World War. This coalition, when formed, can then take steps into forming a future government in arms which will be ready to exercise its enforcing functions, as soon as the establishment of a reasonably permanent position in the island is a reality.

The person performing this all important task should have the following unique characteristics: He should

- (1) Be young and aggressive, a "go-getter", but neither temperamental nor impetuous. He shouldbe able to remain calm under pressure.
- (2) Be acceptable to all factions, if at all possible.
- (3) Be a Cuban, without any direct link to Castro or Batista.
- (4) Be completely bilingual, and completely familiar with both the systems of the United States as well as those of Cuba, due to the close cooperation meeded between the two countries.
- (5) Be accustomed to traveling, and to adapting himself to various circumstances. Certain idiosyncracies of Latin America should be known.
- (6) Have good training in Labor Ralations and Management in general, so as to be able to cope with the different conditions arising, and be able to coolly analyze situations ocurring.
- (7) His character must be above reproach, he must have a record of proven fidelity towards the American ideals of free enterprise and the Bill of Rights, and most important of all he should have the absolute confidence of the administration of the United States of America.

The creation of the job outlined above, appears to the writer to be an absolute necessity, which should be undertaken as soon as feasible. He feels he is ideally suited for it, due to the following qualifications, among others:

My main reasons for applying for an indefinite position of this nature, which I must feel must be created without delay by this administration, are the following two:

It is my sincere belief that I can bring about the union of these groups, with the help of the US government, although I feel that this help should not be publicated at all. A Cuban must be used for this mission, as he should bear the burden if it were to fail. The risk in propaganda losses would be to great to be run by the United States. Secondly, I honestly believe that our results, for Cuba and the entire Hemisphere, would be greatly insured if any plane that are drafted for thedeliverance of our Republic from the hands of International Communism, should be made under the direct surveillance of the USA. In making the goals of the coalition public for the whole continent to see, the risk of someone repeating the steal of the rights of the people once more, would be minimized. I have the acceptance of a large group of professional men, mostly American trained, that realize, as I do, that the true leader of the Hemisphere is the United States, and that only in close cooperation with this leader will our freedoms be preserved and our economic levels raised to their deserved standard. The fight against Communism belongs to all of America. Together we can make the 1960's the decade of Panamericanism and Freedom.
