I am returning, by the safe hand of [Redacted] the three typescript chapters of [Redacted] book. I have looked through this material generally but concentrated on the areas of our interest here. I have only a few suggestions to make.

As you indicated in your letter of 3 February, [Redacted] seems quite willing to delete explicit references to the two batches of material I furnished him. I think he should, if he is still agreeable. The general unavailability of the "OSS report" and "[Redacted] unpublished report" could very well get him into fruitless debates with other scholars and authors on his subject matter. In any event, the things I gave him are not crucial to his argumentation, and the text stands on its own without the footnotes. You will note that we have lined through the references on the typescript. Also see a few notes on the [Redacted] chapter.

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You might remind [Redacted] that I should like the materials I loaned him returned when they have served their purpose. If he wants to make copies for longer retention, it's perfectly all right with me.

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I ask you to thank [Redacted] for letting me read these chapters, and assure him that I look forward with eagerness to seeing the entire book.
