My dear Mr. Peurifoy:-

Fursuant to your request of 31 December 1948, the Jentral Intelligence Agency has examined the services rendered by the Foreign Service of the Department of State with regard to their officacy.

The structure of CIA components and the opinions derived therefrom do not easily lend themselves to simple consolidation into over-all evaluations of the factors you oited, nor can over-all answers to your specific questions be stated in simple terms. Decause of numerous variables.

It is noted, however, that a preponderance of users rate the reporting of the Foreign Service excellent or very good. Those weers she felt that the reporting was less adequate reached this conclusion because the coverage of certain geographic areas was less comprehensive, a deficiency generally believed to be traceable to limited funds and personnel, and to the need for the performance of nonreporting duties by Foreign Service Officers.

I am appending hereto a tabulation by areas of certain specific comments on deficiencies in reporting, together with suggestions for improving the reporting service. There have been included as well some oriticism of functional reporting which is virtually worldwide in its significance.

Those countries, areas, or functional subjects which are not included in the table may be regarded as meeting the meeds of this Agency with both qualitative and quantitative high rating.

As regards the character and adequacy of service received from the Office of Foreign Service in Mashington, it is felt that there could be some improvement in the speed with which our requirements are served on the field, and likewise with which reports are processed to us. There also appears to be a measure of constraint applied to the furnishing to us of certain pelicy papers which often have a direct Refring of Intelligence thinking.
