

PROGEAN FOR INTERSIFICATION OF O/SI RESEARCH AND PRODUCTION IN THE BIOLOGICAL SCIENCES

- 1. As a result of the recent IAC decision on division of responsibility in the scientific and technical field, C/SI is reorienting the work of the Biology Division and has or is undertaking the following steps to intensify its effort in this field. This is in keeping with Mr. Lovett's request.
 - a. Assignment of personnel in the Biology and Medicine Divisions to engage in the systematic survey of the open literature new available on the subject, directed at the development of more adequate collection guidance.
 - Exploration of the possibilities for assistance in this regard through reorientation or expension of external research contracts.
 - c. Congultation with the State Department Science Adviser and those responsible for administering the publications procurement program to examine (1) what additional stops can be taken immediately to extend the collection of open literature abroad, and (2) what steps are possible to strengthen the scientific and agricultural attache systems in the direction of more adequate collection of biological information.

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e. O/SI currently is pursuing the exploitation of special intelligence on a systematic basis in the field of biology. This cannot be intensified unless collection and processing in this field is increased by AFG. This is in turn contingent upon appropriate USCIE action.

MEMORANDUM FOR: CHAIRMAN, INTELLIGENCE ADVISORY COMMITTEE

SUBJECT: Priorities for Intelligence Collection

- 1. Reference is made to Memorandum from the Secretary of Defense to the Secretary of the Army, dated 16 August 1952, a copy of which is attached. A similar memorandum was addressed to the Director of Central Intelligence.
- 2. This memorandum calls attention to the paucity of intelligence available concerning Soviet capabilities and intentions in the field of biological warfare.
- 3. It is agreed that this condition exists, but the intelligence desired must be obtained almost entirely by clandestine agencies. Existing priorities as established by DCID 4/2 place BW and other critical weapons in fifth of seven places.
- 4. In view of the heightened interest in Soviet BW capabilities as evidenced by Secretary Lovett's memorandum, it is recommended that emphasis be placed on this phase of the clandestine collection program.

SUBJECT: Biological Warfare Intelligence

- 1. There is an acute requirement for more reliable information regarding Soviet activities, capabilities and intentions concerning biological warfare. Current intelligence on this subject is so sparse that it does not provide a satisfactory basis for overall evaluation or formulation of Department of Defense planning in this field.
- 2. The difficulties inherent in gathering intelligence on this subject are recognized. However, the continuing need for more complete and reliable information appears to dictate an accelerated emphasis on biological warfare intelligence.
- 3. For your information, I am inclosing a copy of a similar memorandum to the Director of Central Intelligence.

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

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

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- 1. This supert is forwarded in accordance with the undertaking contained in my supermedum of 24 September, relating to intelligence consuming Soviet biological warfare (BW) espabilities and intentions.
- 2. The following actions have been taken with respect to collection of BW intelligence:
 - A. Both the Inter-Agency Priorities Committee and the Intelligence Advisory Committee have considered the BW problem. The Defence agencies do not desire to raise the priority for covert collection of BW intelligence at this time since it would compete with other collection requirements now established by the Department of Defence as vital to early waveled responsibilities.
 - b. USCIN for the first time has accepted detailed priority requirements on HV for exploitation by AFSA. This action should improve both the quantity and quality of information.
 - e. The State Department has accepted detailed requirements calling for the semigment of a high primity to reporting in the fields of agronmy and veterinary medicine which have a direct bearing on NN.
 - d. Discussions are taking place with the State Department on the pessible assignment to Embassy staffs of exientific specialists under the Science Attache Program.

3. CIA is also stepping up its program for research in related basis sciences; notably, increased man-hours have been allocated to our program of systematic analysis of special intelligence pertaining to institutions and areas suspected of having HW potential.

h. A CIA representative has also been appointed to maintain liaison with the Biological Warfare Working Group of the Juint Technical Intelligence Subcommittee of the JIC, and the appently established Scientific Estimates Countitee is taking continuing cognissmes of the EW problem. In a few months it is planned to review the adequacy of these machinisms for coestimating CIA's research activities in the basic existees and these of the Service intelligence agencies in their area of primary requestibility.

5. In spite of the inherent difficulties of determining BW activities, we will pursue this problem aggressively and provide maximum support to the security organizations consequed with defence against BW.



- 1. This is an interim report in response to your memorandum of 16 August on the inadequacy of intelligence regarding Soviet Biological Warfare.
- 2. We are needling the collection activities that are subject to our control through the Inter-Agency Priorities Committee. We are also seeking a higher priority for this type of information from USCIB. Any improvement in research activities will have to be done in the Department of Defense, which has the primary responsibility for such activities. We will supplement this by stepping up our research activities in the basic sciences and this may afford some help. We are also bringing to the attention of the IAC the noted deficiencies in this field, and are asking everybody to cooperate in an effort to improve both collection and research activities. We will follow through on this to the best of our ability.



As you know, the Weapons Systems Evaluation Group has been requested by the Secretary of Defence to prepare, as a matter of priority, an evaluation of biological parfare. Four Agency has already contributed two notable studies, which have been of material assistance to us on this project. He now find it necessary to request additional study on certain aspects on the offensive use of anti-erop pathogenes.

Specifically, we require an estimate of the land use pattern of the principal serval grain growing eblasts of the PASR and an estimate of the probable spread of infection, sufficiently heavy to cause 50% or more grain loss of serval rusts from feel of primary infection.

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Reports, and with the Office of Research and Reports, and with the Office of Research and Reports, and with the Office of Research and the Office of Scientific Intelligence by Br. Allen in my office. Subject to your approval, Off has agreed to undertake the monitorship of the project and to furnish the data on land use pattern, and Offi has agreed to develop the necessary data on rust spread. The latter part of this project is tentatively planned to be done with the cooperation of Br. McGall, a plant pethologist employed by the Operations Research Office, U. S. Army. The project is estimated to require approximately three weeks and, therefore, a date of 9 May has been established as the desired deadline.
