If, during your speech at Newport, you are asked for an example of how CIG coordinates the collection of intelligence, you might cite the study of port data which we are coordinating at the request of the Joint Merchant Ship Statistics Board. A list of the Board's user agencies is attached herewith, showing the varied types of information that are needed --- port facilities, dock space, connecting transportstion facilities, defenses, fuel supply, available labor, tides, weather, hospital facilities, customs, etc. If each agency were to go into this work separately, it would swamp the various attaches. Therefore we coordinate the whole, tie it up in one bundle, see that the information is collected, and then disseminate it as appropriate.

"The Joint Merchant Ship Statistics Board was created by an exchange of communications between participating agencies on April 13, 1944. The agencies participating are:

Coast Guard (Intelligence Division) Department of State National Federation of American Shipping, Inc. Navy (Office of Naval Intelligence) (Naval Transportation Service, Office of the Chief of Naval Operations) U. S. Army (Office of the Chief of Transportation)

The express purpose of the Board is to submit recommendations to the heads of the participating agencies with respect to the consolidation and development of information on vessels, ports, shippards and other related facilities with a view to eliminating duplication of effort in the compilation of more accurate and reliable marine data.
