COORDINATION OF U. S. AID PROGRAMS FOR FAR EASTERN AREAS

Approved by Defense and Treasury, August 17; by NSRB and ECA, August 18; by Commerce, with comments, August 19. Awaiting action by other Council members with respect to the suggestion in the reference memo of August 14.

NSC 88 circulated for information and referred to the NSC Staff for use in the preparation of a report for Council consideration. At its meeting on October 19, the Senior NSC Staff agreed that State should prepare for Staff consideration a draft report on the subject, taking into account the views of the JCS in NSC 88. Awaiting draft report from State.

THE POSITION OF THE UNITED STATES WITH RESPECT TO INDOCHINA

At its meeting on October 19, the Senior NSC Staff agreed to consider this subject further upon receipt of a draft paper on the subject prepared by the Southeast Asia Aid Committee, together with the comments of the State Department, the Joint Secretaries, and the Joint Chiefs of Staff thereon.

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CURRENT NSC STAFF PROJECTS (Cont'd)

UNITED STATES POLICY WITH RESPECT TO TURKEY
(NSC Action No. 366-c)

In accordance with the reference Council action, the Senior NSC Staff discussed the subject on November 8 and agreed that State, in consultation with Defense, would prepare a draft report. Awaiting State report. (See also related projects in Section 3C.)

THE POSITION OF THE UNITED STATES WITH RESPECT TO IRAN

On October 25 the Senior Staff agreed that a draft report on the subject should be based upon a complete reassessment of the U. S. position toward Iran, including a review of the applicability to Iran of the basic U. S. position relating to the Eastern Mediterranean and the Middle East, approved in 1947, and of current British thinking regarding this area.

On October 30 the CIA member was requested, with assistance from appropriate departments and agencies, to prepare as early as possible an intelligence estimate of the extent to which the Western European economy is dependent upon Middle Eastern oil, and of the related problems involved in alternate sources of supply. Awaiting report by CIA member. (See also related projects in Section 3C.)

COLLABORATION WITH FRIENDLY GOVERNMENTS ON OPERATIONS AGAINST GUERRILLAS
(NSC 90)

NSC 90 circulated for Council information and referred to the Senior NSC Staff for use in the preparation of a report. On October 30 the Senior State and JCS members undertook to collaborate in the preparation of a draft paper covering both the political and military aspects of the problem; and the Senior CIA member agreed to prepare an intelligence estimate on current and probable areas and characteristics of guerrilla warfare. Awaiting joint report by State, JCS, and CIA members.

UNITED STATES POLICY WITH RESPECT TO BERLIN AND EASTERN GERMANY
(NSC 89; NSC 73/4, par. 42; Memos for NSC from Executive Secretary, subject: "Additional Airlift to Support the Far East", dated September 27 and November 20, 1950; NSC Action No. 368; Memo for Senior NSC Staff from Executive Secretary, subject: "United States Policy with Respect to Berlin and Eastern Germany", dated October 31, 1950)

At its 69th Meeting, the Council noted the reference memorandum of September 27, and the fact that the situation presented therein would be taken into consideration in the studies on the Berlin blockade referred to in par. 42 of NSC 73/4. Memoranda on the subject by the Deputy Under Secretary of State and the Secretary of Defense were circulated for Council information as NSC 89, and referred to the NSC Staff for use in connection with this staff project. The Senior Staff agreed, on October 25, to consider the subject further upon receipt of a study on airlift capabilities under preparation in the JCS. JCS study circulated to Senior Staff by the reference memo of October 31. Subsequent memorandum by the Deputy Secretary of Defense (reference memo of November 20) circulated for Council information and referred to the Staff for consideration in connection with this project. JAPANESE PEACE TREATY
(NSC 60/1)

On September 15, the Senior Staff agreed that this subject should be a continuing project and that accordingly the Senior State member should keep the Senior Staff informed of any security policy issues which may arise, with a view to further consideration of the subject. (See also related Progress Report on NSC 13/3 in Section 2C.)

UNITED STATES POLICY TOWARD SPAIN
(NSC 72; NSC 72/1; NSC Action No. 312; Memo for NSC Consultants, subject: "The Provision of Military Aid to Spain", dated August 3, 1950; Revised memo of Senior NSC Staff meeting, August 11, 1950)

JCS views circulated as NSC 72 for Council information. State views in response to NSC 72, circulated as NSC 72/1 also for Council information. At its 60th Meeting the Council discussed the subject, deferred further action and directed the NSC Consultants to study the reference papers in preparation for further Council consideration. A memo for the President by the Secretary of Defense on "The Provision of Military Aid to Spain", referred by the President to the Executive Secretary, was circulated by the reference memo of August 3 for the information and use of the NSC Consultants and Staff in connection with their study of NSC 72 and

UNITED STATES COURSES OF ACTION WITH RESPECT TO KOREA

(NSC Action No. 378; NSC 81/1, NSC 81/2 and NSC 73/4; Memo for NSC from Executive Secretary, same subject, dated November 10, 1950; Memos for Senior NSC Staff from Executive Secretary, same subject, dated November 13, 15, and 17, 1950)

At its 71st Meeting, the Council directed the Staff to study the views of State, the JCS, and CIA, in the light of the Council discussion, and to advise the Council as to further steps which should be recommended to the President to meet the Korean situation. At its meeting on November 10, the Senior Staff agreed that the State Department would draft recommendations for consideration by the Senior NSC Staff, prior to their submission to the Council. An interim report by the NSC Staff was submitted as NSC 81/2 for consideration by the Council and the Secretary of the Treasury, and, in view of later developments, was withdrawn on November 30.

Subsequent draft reports considered by the Senior Staff on November 20, 29, 30, December 1, 4 and 5. Preparation of further drafts deferred pending developments.

SANACC 360/14 on the subject, and amendments proposed by the Secretary of Defense, referred by the Council at its 42nd Meeting to the NSC Staff for use in preparation of a report pursuant to NSC 48, "U. S. Policy Toward Asia", and for re-examination in light of that study (NSC 48/2) and the discussion at the meeting. On November 3, the Senior Staff referred a Staff Assistants' draft report to State for preparation of a new draft. Revised State draft circulated December 6. Preliminary discussion by Staff Assistants December 11. To be scheduled for further consideration by the Staff Assistants at an early meeting.

RELEASE OF INFORMATION REGARDING NEW WEAPONS

(Memo for NSC Consultants and AEC Representative from Executive Secretary, same subject, dated July 5, 1950)

At the direction of the President, the Council and the Chairman, Atomic Energy Commission, undertook a consideration of the general problem of weapons information, including atomic weapons, in order to make appropriate recommendations to the President on the subject. A draft report, prepared by the Executive Secretary in accordance with the discussion at a meeting on June 22, has been circulated to the NSC Staff and a representative of the AEC by the reference memo. Awaiting redraft of this report by Defense.

UNITED STATES AND ALLIED WAR OBJECTIVES IN THE EVENT OF GLOBAL WAR

(NSC 79; Memo for NSC from Executive Secretary, same subject, dated September 6, 1950)

JCS memo (NSC 79) circulated for Council information and referred to the Staff for use in the preparation of a report.

The Senior Staff designated an ad hoc group to draft a report to include both a statement of war objectives in the event of global war, and such related questions as a statement of the conditions that the U. S. would be willing to accept for a peaceful settlement with the USSR and its satellites. At the initial meeting of the ad hoc group under the chairmanship of the State member on October 6, the form and content of a response to the problems posed by NSC 79 were discussed and agreed upon. Awaiting draft by the State Policy Planning Staff.

UNITED STATES POLICY ON DEFECTORS

(NSC 86; NSC Action No. 364; Memo for Ad Hoc Committee on NSC 86, from Executive Secretary, same subject, dated December 5, 1950)

At its 69th Meeting the Council referred NSC 86, without endorsement of the proposals contained therein, to the Staff for the preparation of a report. The Senior Staff subsequently designated an ad hoc committee, including a representative from the Department of Justice, to prepare a draft report.

PROPOSED NSC STUDY OF MANPOWER

(Memo for Senior NSC Staff from Executive Secretary, same subject, dated December 4, 1950)

Memorandum by the Senior State Member on the subject circulated by the reference memo. On December 12 the Senior Staff designated an ad hoc group under the chairmanship of a JCS official and with officials from State, NSRB, Mr. Harriman's office and CIA to prepare a draft report. Awaiting report by ad hoc group. (See also related item in Section 4.)

OPERATION OF ISBRANDTSEN COMPANY, INC. SHIPS TO COMMUNIST COUNTRIES

(NSC 87; Memos for Senior NSC Staff from Executive Secretary, subject: "Strengthening of Export Control Laws", dated October 16 and 25, 1950; Memo for NSC from Executive Secretary, same subject, dated November 1, 1950; Memo for Special Committee on East-West Trade from Executive Secretary, subject: "East-West Trade", dated November 18, 1950)

Referred to the Special Committee on East-West Trade by the Senior Staff on November 8, this project is to be scheduled for discussion at an early Special Committee meeting.

NSC DETERMINATIONSON EAST-WEST TRADE

On December 6 the Special Committee on East-West Trade agreed that the Department of Commerce with the assistance of representatives from State, Defense, NSRB, Treasury, ECA and CIA would coordinate the preparation of statistical studies on the subject and submit those studies to the Special Committee for evaluation. Awaiting reports from Commerce. (See also Section 2C.)

4. OTHER CURRENT COUNCIL PROJECTSAPPRAISAL OF FOREIGN ECONOMIC INTELLIGENCE REQUIREMENTS,
FACILITIES AND ARRANGEMENTS RELATED TO THE NATIONAL SECURITY
(Memo for NSC from Executive Secretary, same subject, dated February 7, 1950; NSC Action No. 282)

In approving the proposal by the Acting Chairman, NSRB, in the reference memo, the NSC directed (NSC Action No. 282) the CIA, in collaboration with the Government agencies concerned, to organize and conduct a study of foreign economic intelligence requirements, facilities and arrangements related to the national security, and based on the findings of this study, to prepare for Council consideration and action a comprehensive plan for satisfying the foreign economic intelligence requirements of the national security and for a coordinated interagency effort to this end based on a definite allocation of responsibilities among the agencies concerned.

Interim reports by the Central Intelligence Agency on September 8, October 4, and November 7, concerning the status of this project, indicate that the surveys of governmental facilities for the production of economic intelligence were scheduled for completion by November 30, and that a coordinated draft statement of requirements for foreign economic intelligence is scheduled for completion by December 14. Awaiting report by CIA.

NATIONAL MANPOWER MOBILIZATION POLICY
(NSC 77; NSC Action No. 328-b)

At its 63rd Meeting (NSC Action No. 328), the Council, the Secretary of the Treasury, and the Secretary of Labor considered NSC 77 and noted the President's directive that the Chairman, NSRB, in consultation with the Departments of Defense and Labor, should develop a national manpower mobilization policy. The Chairman, NSRB, is developing a policy, in which all but one of a number of issues have been agreed upon to date, in consultation with the Secretaries of Defense and Labor. Awaiting report by the Chairman, NSRB.

OTHER CURRENT COUNCIL PROJECTS (Cont'd)

SUPPORT FOR THE VOICE OF AMERICA IN THE FIELDS OF INTELLIGENCE AND OF RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT

(NSC 66; Memos for NSC from Executive Secretary, same subject, dated April 4, May 11, and September 11, 1950)

In accordance with NSC 66 the Secretaries of State and Defense, the Chairman, FCC, and the Director of Central Intelligence were requested to designate representatives to prepare a report for consideration by the Council, the Secretary of the Treasury, and the Chairman, FCC, in the event that the recommendations in NSC 66 were approved. Comments by Defense, FCC and CIA were transmitted by the reference memo of May 11 and, in the light of the Defense comment that further Council action should be deferred until an ad hoc committee of the IAC completed its investigation of the problem, the departments and agencies concerned agreed informally that this item should not be scheduled for Council consideration until the Director of Central Intelligence and the IAC had submitted a report.

An interim report by the Director of Central Intelligence, (the reference memo of September 11) indicated that the views of USCIB were being sought. Awaiting views of USCIB and final report by the Director of Central Intelligence.

THE POSITION OF THE UNITED STATES WITH RESPECT TO ASIA

(NSC 48/2; Memo for NSC from Executive Secretary, same subject, dated November 20, 1950)

Memorandum by the Deputy Secretary of Defense on the subject, circulated for Council information by the reference memo and referred to the Secretary of State for consideration of the action proposed in the second paragraph thereof. Awaiting response by the Secretary of State.

U. S. POSITION REGARDING A CEASE-FIRE IN KOREA

(NSC Action No. 390)

At its 74th Meeting the Council noted the President's approval of a statement that the JCS will prepare as a matter of urgency the military conditions on which a cease-fire would be acceptable. Awaiting JCS report.

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
