Four (4) soviet sub-marines and two (2) coast guard vessels were observed being anchored near the mole of the naval base. Details were not observed.

Upon the ship's arrival, the Captain signed ready-made declarations with regard to armament, ammunitions, radio sets, pigeons, etc., but no search was éarried out on board the ship by either the security or the customs, nor were the members of the crew going ashore subjected to any search. The ship was guarded day and night throughout its stay in the harbor, by three (3) policemen armed with pistols. These guards stood on the mole at the bows, the stern and near the ladder.

The crew were free to go ashore on the basis of their seamen's booklets and a bass perforated into two parts. The guard at the ladder, after checking the identity of the man going ashore on the basis of the picture on his seamen's
