1. IRAN: ISLACIC FEPUBLICAN PARTY PRESSES OFFENSIVE

Ayatollah Beheshti's Islamic Republican Party (IRP) is continuing its drive to reutralize its principal opponents: Bani-Sadr and the left, particularly the Mujahiddin al-Khalq. Khomeini seems unable or unwilling to prevent the resulting weakening of Bani-Sadr's wing. We see Fhomeini's refusal to censure the party increasing clerical domination of Iran.

The IRP is determined to eliminate all opposition forces and dominate the new government. To achieve its goals, the IRP is:

--actively supporting Khomeini's demand that the bureaucracies he purged, a process that will eliminate a reservoir of support for Bani-Sadr;

Khomeini has played into Beheshti's hands. Khomeini's vague speeches stressing the need for Islamic decisiveness and unity in the face of "imperialist threats" provide the ideological umbrella under which the IPP can freely act. The speeches essentially condone the maintenance of the decentralized status quo and the preservation of the revolutionary apparatus and fervor. This rhetoric thus puts Bani-Sadr on the defensive in his efforts to centralize power.

Nonetheless, the IRP has problems. Bani-Sadr has counterattacked by disclosing tapes of an Islamic Republican party member who apparently advocated a coup. Moreover, the Iranian governorgeneral of West Amerbaijan claims that Beheshti's tactics have led to dissatisfaction within IRP ranks and to the loss of Khomeini's support. We have no evidence to confirm this last claim. Most indications point toward a continuing consolidation of IRP power.

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
