- 1. The Nationalist Government has appointed the following Chiefs (Secretary-Generals) of the various Hoshuns in the Chahar and Silingol Aimaks:

- 2. Most of the Mongolians in Chahar Province have a strong antipathy for the newly-appointed Hoshun Chiefs because all of these men were among those who fled to a comparatively safe and comfortable life in Peiping after the Japanese surrender. The people who actually suffered hardships by remaining in Chahar feel that the Nationalist Government would not reinstate these men in public offices without first considering the desires of the people of Inner Mongolia.
