

It is reported that a Shikak courier saw large gatherings of Soviet troops, including horses, on the Soviet bank of the Arexes River, near a village named Kara Köy, close to the spot at which the Barsani Kurds crossed into Eussie. The courier claimed that these troop gatherings appeared to be more of a permenent than of a temporary nature.

2. It is further reported that the Kurds and the Iranian Government are workied, and that Prime Minister Quasa plans to make a protest to the Soviet Embassy concerning the above information.

Comment: Soviet border concentrations have been rumored for some time. The report that Soviet deserters gave the same information to members of the Iranian army seems doubtful. Despite the tendency of Ambassador Firuz (Iranian Ambassador to Moscow) to exaggerate Soviet threats, it is doubtful that the Iranian Government planted the report of Russian troop gatherings as a means of obtaining outside help. The answer to these reports may be either that these gatherings are normal troop movements or attempts at intimidation by the Soviets in order to get the oil concession by a show of force.
