- 1. Recently the Yugoslav Consulate in Salonika has attempted to ascertain the ames of all elements in Greece acting against the "national interests of Greece." It then tried to unite all of these in a group eventually to be used to serve Yugoslav interests.
- 2. The Yugoslav Consulate is making persistent efforts to ascertain the names of those who during the occupation were enrolled in the "Bulgarian Club" and the Rumanian Community, particularly those imbued with Communist principles. The effort is directed first at the most important Bulgar ophrones, with the hope that later all the rest may be incorporated in an organization dependent upon the Consulate. Among the Rumanophrones, the effort is made to win first the teachers in the former Rumanian Schools in Greece and through them to penetrate the Rumano-Vlach element.
- 3. Peter Guberina was especially active in this attempt before his recall; later this work has been continued by Martin Gabricevic, Yugoslav Vice-Consul.
- The Consulate's efforts have not made much headway among the Bulgarophrones, because they do not wish to subject themselves to Yugoslav influence.
- 5. There has been, however, a willingness among the Rumano-Vlach teaching personnel to serve the Yugoslav Consulate. Four individuals have become agents of the Yugoslav Consulate.
- 6. The Consulate is also attempting to ascertain the fate of those refugees who escaped from beyond the Iron Curtain into Greece. This is a permanent target of the Consulate. The Consulate believes that these refugees are being organized to be sent into Yugoslavia for action against the present regime.
- 7. The Consulate is attempting to learn the names of Greeks who collaborated with the Germans during the occupation and who now hold important posts in the Greek Government and Army. Source does not know what the Yugoslav Consulate wants with this information, but suspects that Yugoslavia will attempt to use it in an attack on Greece in the General Assembly of the United Nations.
