Buring a visit to 25X1X6 stated his belief that the coup dietat of 14 December in 25X1X6 \* Alvador which ousted President Castaneda was purely an impromptu affair, and not an elaborately planned move. In his opinion, Lt. Col. Manuel Cordoba and Major Oscar Bolanos suddenly decided that Castaneda should be removed, and they proceeded to do so without having any plans for a government to succeed him. ent on to say that Cordora and Bolanos were caught up in their own indecision, and leftist elements 25X1X6 moved in before they could prevent it. The only solution they saw was to tall for Major Osorio in Mexico to come and take power in El Salvador to prevent the leftists from assuming full control. stated that in his opinion Col. Osmin Aguirre would emerge as 25X1X6 the final victor in the struggle for control, since Col. Aguirre would erganize a counter-movement and set up a move conservative government. 015 Reyes Guerra said that Cordoba, Bolanos, and Osorio are really loyal followers of Aguirre. 25X1A6a Comment. A review of reports received at Guatemala prior to the Salvadoran coup d'etat suggests that Salvadoran Communists may have had prior knowledge of the recent coup d'etat and possibly aided it. Many members of the Salvadoran Committee for National Liberation (CSIN) had been exiled in Guatemala, including Daniel Castaneda, Virgilio Guerra, Jose H. Zamora, Juan Valiente, Alberto Vides Ramos, Miguel Marmol and Pedro Ayala. These men, believed to be Communists, are known to have associated closely with high officials of the Guatemaian government, including the President and cabinet. If the CSIN CELEGY ID CLO CHEROED members were aware of the impending coup dietat, there was plenty of Destinent Bo. epportunity for the Guatemalan government to obtain such knowledge. President Arevalo of Guatemala promptly recognized the new regime in alvador, instead of displaying his usual hostility toward a military junta. The Guatemalan government, moreover, displayed no  $\Box 3$ surprise, as did other groups, that Col. Osmin Aguirre was not behind the coup. - 1599/09/09 CIA-RDP82-00457R002300260p05-7

- 3. A letter from Moises Castro y Morales, intellectual leader of Salvadoran Communists, advised Dr. Angel Gochez Castro, president of the CSIN that the "feudal copitalistic regime" in El Salvador must be liquidated. In another letter Castro y Morales wrote to Jose H. Zamora, known communist and officer of the CSIN that a completely organized group was needed to take over the leader—ship of the revolt when called upon by the people to do so."
- A. Major Oscar Oscaro, at present the head of the governing Junta of all Salvador under the new regime, associated very closely with Major Humberto Villalta (recently deposed as Chief of the Armed Forces) who held the position of Secretary of Propaganda of the CSIN. Villalta, while not openly Communist, likewise associated elosely with many Communists of the CSIN.
- 5. A report from El Salvador dated l August 1947 stated that the Communist movement in El Salvador depended greatly on outside help, and intimated that the Communists might have some working agreement with Col. Jose Arturo Castellanos, a Salvadoran army officer living in Mexico City. Castellanos was also closely in touch with Villalta.
- 6. Atilio Carcia Prieto, Secretary of Finance of the CSIN, was effered the portfolio of Fomento and Public Works in the new cabinet. He reportedly refused the offer because his brother had been imprisoned by the Junta.
- 7. Many Salvadorans are coming back from Guatemala where they had been exiled. These include Daniel Castaneda, Virgilio Guerra, Miguel Marmol and Efrain Rios, all Communists and all CSIN members. This is another indication that the CSIN has benefitted from the new government, and that returning Communists are planning to take an active part in the government and labor affairs in El Salvador.)
