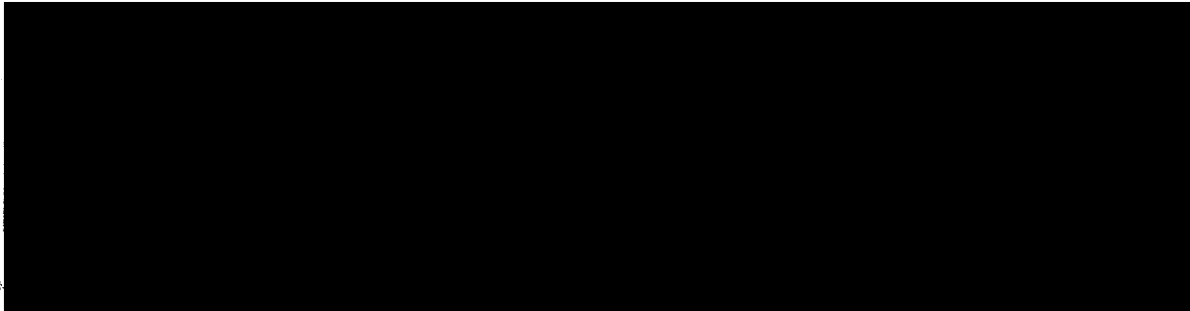
SUBJECT Chinese Communist Meetings in  
Shench'uan and Kowloon

1. The 15 persons present at the special meeting held in Shench'uan on 29 June 1950 by FANG Fang and LI wei-pang (LI wai-peng - 李維邦) included the following: SSU-T'U Chieh (司徒傑), deputy commander of the 41 Army and concurrently commander of the 123 Division and garrison commander of the Huiyang-Paoan sector; and CH'I Feng (祁峯)\*, chairman of the Paoan Military Control Commission. During the meeting FANG instructed Chinese military and political cadres on the Sino-British frontier to create incidents in order to provide a pretext for the recovery of Hong Kong and Kowloon by the Chinese Communists.
2. When FANG and LI went to Kowloon on 30 June 1950 they traveled incognito by train. In Kowloon FANG stayed in room 408, Kimberley Hotel, and LI in room 204, Miramar Hotel, both in Kimberley Road, Kowloon\*\*. At the meeting of important Chinese Communist personnel which was held that night in FANG's hotel room, 22 persons were present, including: LIANG Chieh (梁俠)\*\*\*, CHENG Che (鄭哲), FU Jun-chin (傅潤芝), and CHEN Shih-hsiang (陳式湘). At this meeting FANG gave the following instructions:
  - a. Chinese Communists were to tighten their controls of labor and student organizations so as to neutralize any infiltration by reactionary elements, and to absorb as many pro-Communist elements as possible in order to enlarge the field of operations.
  - b. An incident was to be created in Kowloon before the end of August 1950, beginning in a small way but so enlarged by agitation as to end with bloodshed.
  - c. After the incident, the persons openly engaged in it were to withdraw to safety in Chinese territory, which members of Communist organs in Hong Kong and Kowloon were to notify their associates who had positions in various urban welfare committees to ask the local residents to hold meetings demanding freedom of self-determination and asking the Chinese Communist forces to come to Hong Kong and Kowloon to protect Chinese nationals.

- 3. On 1 July 1950 FANG and LI returned to Shench'uan, from where FANG went back to Canton. LI remained in Shench'uan, at the New Asia Hotel, to control the development of the incident.
- 4. LI Wei-pang is chief of the Political Section of the Public Safety Department of the Kwangtung Provincial Government. In connection with the plan to create an incident to precipitate and justify an armed invasion of Kowloon and Hong Kong, the South China Politburo has appointed LI commander of the Military Workers' Unit, and placed 125 experienced low-ranking cadres under his command in this unit. Beginning on 25 June 1950, these members were to infiltrate into Kowloon and scatter. Each five members form a team, and five teams form a group, five of which constitute the unit. The contact point for the members of the unit is the Chinese pen shop, Chi Ta Ch'eng Mao Pi Tien ( ), in Shanghai Street, Yaumati, Kowloon. A courier is sent daily to make contact with LI Wei-pang.
