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SUBJECT Chinese Communist Efforts to Win Over Guerrilla Leaders in Macao

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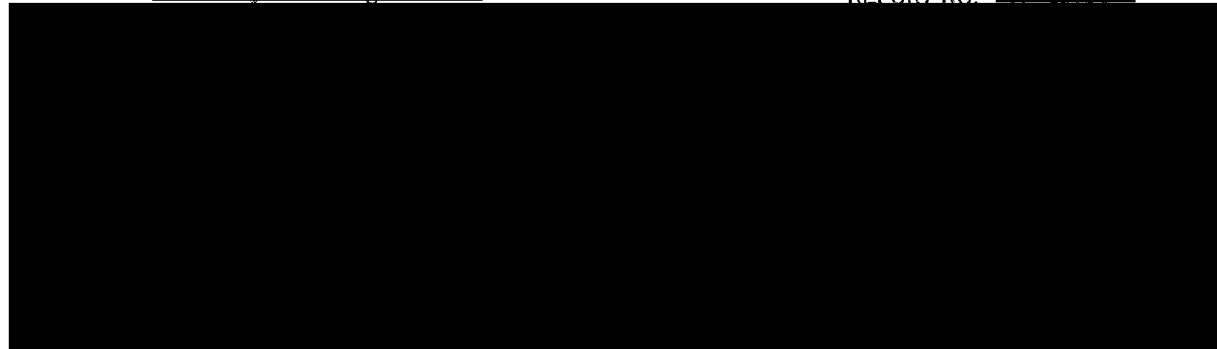

On 29 July 1950 CHOU Han-ling\*, a former nationalist military official who defected to the Communists, made a second trip from Hong Kong to Macao. In Macao he got in touch with CH'EN Lan and CH'EN Sheng (陳生). He also received a clandestine visit from WU Kuei-p'ing (吳桂平), a guerrilla leader of Enp'ing hsien (112-19, 22-12), whom he unsuccessfully tried to persuade to return to the mainland to work with the Communists.
2. His failure to win over to the Communists his former associates who are now guerrilla leaders made CHOU afraid to return to Canton. In early August, when he was instructed to go to Shihch'i to attend a Peace Preservation Conference, he replied by submitting his resignation as Vice Chairman of the Peace Preservation Commission\*\*.
3. On 15 August 1950, at the home of WU Chia\*\*\*, CHOU conferred with CHENG Tsu-te (鄭祖德), former general secretary of the Kuomintang in Chungshan hsien, and CHENG Tao-shih (鄭道實), former chairman of the Chungshan hsien assembly. The two CHENGs, who have been appointed members of the Chinese Communist Peace Preservation Commission, make regular trips to Macao where they try to persuade the guerrilla leaders to cease their anti-Communist activities and work with the Communists.
4. Shortly before 22 August 1950 CHOU was placed in charge of the coordination of the Peace Preservation Commission's activities in Macao. He appointed WU Ping\*, formerly a police inspector of Hsinhui hsien, as his assistant, and applied, giving CH'EN Lan and YEN Hsien-chou\* as references, for permission to establish a large opium den as a means of financing his activities. CH'EN Lan sponsored WU Ping as a member of the Yau Luen Athletic Association, and assisted him to make contacts within that organization. Wharf coolies were instructed to assist in watching the movements of former Nationalist officials and guerrilla leaders who might be returning to the mainland.
5. On 25 August 1950 CHOU, who had rented a room on the second floor at

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10 Yeh Lu Ch'ien Street as a contact place, called a meeting of his former associates and followers from Hsinhui, Chungshan and Shunte for the purpose of persuading them to refrain from guerrilla operations against the Communists. The men who met with him, TENG (滕), CHOU Niu (周牛), CH'EN Sung-po (陳松波), WU Jen-p'ing (吳任平) and others, were appointed members of the Chinese Communist Peace Preservation Commission, on CHOU's recommendation.
