SUPPLEMENT TO REPORT NO. 25X1X

1. YUAN Yao\*, head of the Macao Underground Activities Station of the South China Sub-Bureau, went to Canton and obtained the approval of YEH Chien-ying and FANG Fang for the expansion of the Intelligence and Armed Activities Divisions\* of the Macao unit. The Intelligence Division is to be increased by the addition of a fifth section under the leadership of CH'EN Ch'uan (陳川). A fourth section, headed by LIU Yung-nien (劉永年), is to be added to the Armed Activities Division. In both Divisions, the size of each section is to be increased from 11 to 15 members. The chiefs and deputy chiefs of both Divisions are to have pistols; each section in the Intelligence Division is to have two pistols. All members of the Armed Activities Division are to be issued pistols and 100 bullets, and the Division is to be equipped with ten sub-machine guns of new type. This plan is to take effect in January 1951.
2. On 7 December 1950 YUAN Yao called a meeting of his top-ranking associates to report to them the directives received from higher authorities and discuss the steps to be taken in connection with them. Among those who attended the meeting, which was held at the Nan Kuang Trading Company, were P'ENG Chao\*, MA Ping-yuan\*, AO Lin\*, OU Kuang (區光), LEANG P'ei\*, CHANG Ch'iang (張江), CHENG Hsuei (鄭奎), FANG Shao-mia (方紹民), CHANG Wei-ya (張維亞), and HUANG Chien-lung\*\*. Problems discussed included the following:
  - a. Expansion of the Anti-America, Aid-to-Korea campaign in Macao.\*
  - b. radical measures to be taken against American, British and Kuomintang underground activities in Macao, in an effort to wipe them out.
  - c. A special watch to be kept on the activities of Kuomintang members in Macao, with special reference to their underground activities.
  - d. Close observation of the measures taken by the Macao Government and of the persons in authority favorable to anti-Communist activities in Macao.\*\*

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- e. Efforts to enlist the help of the personnel of the Macao Government in tracing the activities of Kuomintang and American agents.
3. LIANG Chih-chih\*\*\* is leader of the liaison section of the Macao Underground Activities Station and concurrently underground liaison officer for the Communists in Chungshan, the Kwangtung-Kwangsi Column, the Shihch'i Military Controll Commission (MCC), the hsien government of Chungshan, and the Pearl River Administrator's Office. He is manager of the Jih Hsin (日新) Bank, a member of the board of directors of the Macao Chinese Chamber of Commerce, and president of the association of drygoods dealers. A businessman of long standing in Macao, LIANG has been a member of the Chinese Communist Party (CCP) for more than ten years. His bank has served as a liaison and financial organ for the CCP in Chungshan, the former East River and Pearl River Columns, the Kwangtung-Kwangsi Column, and for the Underground Activities Station. He is in charge of the Chinese Communist businessmen's movement in Macao, and has received authority from the CCP to recruit Kuomintang members and others to the Communist cause. LIANG was a member of the group which made a tour of Northeast China, and served as Macao representative at the People's Representatives' Conference in Chungshan hsien. He is in close contact with K'O Lin, CHANG P'ei-ling\*\*\*, LIANG P'ei, HO Hsien\*, LIANG Ch'iang\*, KAO Chen-wu\*\*\*, MA Wan-ch'i\*\*\*\*, HUANG Chien-lung, CH'EN Chih-sheng\*, CHANG Ch'iang, HSIEH Tsai-sheng\*\*\* and other Communists.
  4. HUANG Cho-ju (黃卓如), also known as HUANG Ping (黃冰), a young Kwangtung woman who was born in Shanghai, was recently transferred to Hong Kong and Macao to do intelligence work for the Third International Far East Information Office\*\*. A graduate of the military intelligence school at Chiamussa, she has worked in Tientsin, Peiping, Mukden and other northern cities, and was transferred to Canton in the fall of 1950. HUANG speaks English and Russian in addition to Mandarin, Cantonese, and the dialect of Swatow. Her duties include contacting, at social gatherings and in places of recreation, American, British, Chinese and Portuguese officials and wealthy businessmen and high-ranking employees of foreign agencies, for the purpose of gaining information. In Hong Kong she stays in foreign hotels, but her mailing address is 123 Connaught Road, second floor.\*\*\*\*\*
  5. LI Sung (李松), a Chinese physician in Hong Kong, is an underground agent for the Third International Far East Information Office. His centers of activity are his clinic in the East Asia Bank Building, and his residence at 7 Garden Terrace.\*\*\*\*\*
  6. LI I\*, also known as LI Shu-i (黎叔毅), a former member of the executive committee of the Kuomintang branch in Macao, defected to the Communists at the end of 1949 and has been doing intelligence work and helping in the underground labor movement, under K'O Lin and Liu Heng-chung\*\*. He is a graduate of Kuomin (國民) University, Canton, and was for some time the dean of the Futan (福田) Middle School, which has closed. He was head of the business department of the Shih Chieh Jih Pao, an adviser to the Macao Barbers' Union, and an important leader in the Kuomintang labor movement. He has been assisting K'O Lin's labor movement and trying to persuade Kuomintang labor movement personnel and laborers to join the Communists, as well as gathering information on all anti-Communist activities in Macao. He also works for the division of the Third International Far East Information Office which is headed by his fellow-townsmen, LIU Heng-chung.
  7. TSENG Shao (曾紹), also known as TSENG Hsin (曾新), an intelligence staff officer of the Kwangtung-Kwangsi Column, has been sent to Macao as head of its Macao intelligence unit. He is a member of the CCP, and was trained in the War Staff Training Class of the Chinese Communist Military Academy in northern Shensi, after which he served as staff officer under TSENG Sheng. In Macao his organization is concerned with anti-Communist

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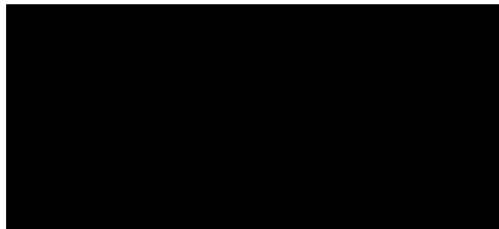

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activities of all sorts, and with the agencies maintained in Macao by mainland anti-Communist guerrilla units. He also watches the activities of gang leaders, military men, racketeers, wealthy individuals, and persons of local prominence. One of his missions is to induce Kuomintang military personnel and agents to defect to the Kwangtung-Kwangsi Column. TSENG maintains liaison with intelligence stations along the coast of Chungshan hsien. He keeps in secret contact with YUAN Yao, K'O Lin, P'ENG Chao, LIANG P'ei, KAO Chen-wu, LIANG Chih-chih, MA Wan-ch'i and KUO Hsin-chien.

8. HUA Chen-chung (華振中), former deputy chief of staff of the Kuomintang Canton Pacification Command and also Commissioner of Civil Affairs of the Nationalist Kwangtung Provincial Government, finding himself neglected, out of work, and restricted in his movements after his defection to the Communists, proposed to YEH Chien-ying that he be assigned to do underground work in Hong Kong and Macao. This was approved, and he was sent to recruit Kuomintang personnel to the Communist cause, and to get information on their activities in Macao and Hong Kong. He accordingly let it be known that he was no longer associated with the Communists, and established himself in room 106 at the Hsin Chia Pin (新嘉賓) Hotel. He travels frequently between Hong Kong and Macao, and is assisted by his kinsman, KUAN P'ei-t'ien (官沛天), who visits Canton to keep HUA in touch with the South China Sub-Bureau. In early December 1960 HUA was instructed by FANG Fang to extend his activities to cover American activities, especially those connected with mainland guerrillas.
