1. K. Werdojo, Chairman of the Labor faction in Parliament, representing the Central Organisasi Buruh Seluruh Indonesia (SOBSI), stays at the Hotel Centraal, Djalan Segara 1, when in Djakarta. He also has offices at SOBSI headquarters, Gang Tengah 29.
2. Werdojo intends to visit as many places as possible in Indonesia, contacting student, youth, and labor organizations for the purpose of Communist agitation. He recently made a trip to Bali to agitate among the left-wing Balinese youth groups. Werdojo feels the trip was successful, and has intimated that his agitation initiated the present disorder on Bali. Terrorist youth gangs, operating under the guise of abolishing feudalism and punishing Dutch collaborators, actually are trying to break down law and order on Bali.
3. According to Werdojo, the Chinese Communist Government maintains a special propaganda department for Indonesia in Peking. This office receives some of its supplies from Moscow. Books and other propaganda material are sent to the Chinese Embassy in Djakarta by the Indonesian propaganda section in Peking. The Partai Komunis Indonesia (PKI) in turn receives some of this material from the Chinese Embassy. So far, such assistance has been confined to these Communist propaganda books and pamphlets and to advice given the PKI by the Embassy on the handling of PKI propaganda work.
4. Werdojo is anxious to enlist financial support for the reconstruction of the wrecked school at Sawah Besar #3, Gang Pondok Rotan, Djakarta. He wants to turn this building into a Communist propaganda center, particularly since 95 percent of the neighborhood's inhabitants are laborers.
5. Werdojo thinks the SOBSI in Semarang has successfully carried out its strikes in that city and is now definitely in control of the labor movement in the area.
6. The Communists are not too strong in South Sumatra, although they have showed some strength among labor organizations in Lahat, Palembang, and Telok Betung. Werdojo thinks they are trying to gain greater influence in the unions representing the vital industries in Indonesia. In South Sumatra, the Communists are particularly interested in controlling the coal miners' unions.
7. Alimin is remaining behind the scenes in PKI activity; however, he still controls PKI policies. He will appear as leader of the PKI only when necessary.

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
