
SUPPLEMENT TO REPORT NO. 25X1X

DO NOT CIRCULATE

- 1. On 28 June about 20 Soviet officers, ranking from major to general, arrived at P'yongyang via Sinuiju to act as advisers to the North Korean People's Security Ministry. This group was dispatched directly from the Soviet army headquarters to act as a liaison group, relaying orders regarding policy to be followed by the Chinese Communist and North Korean forces in the military situation. The nature of their orders is unknown. The Soviets are members of the "Soviet Army Secret Special Approval Bureau."
- 2. From 28 June to 4 July approximately 120,000 North Korean and Chinese Communist troop replacements moved from Sunch'on (125-56, 39-25) through Songch'on (126-13, 39-15) to Simup (126-47, 39-55), where the troops were split up, proceeding to the Koksan (126-40, 38-47) and Wonsan areas for disposition on the front lines. An undetermined number of North Korean and Chinese Communist troops were replaced on 4 and 5 July and began to move northward over the same routes from the Koksan area. Replacements were supplied Soviet rifles, new uniforms, Japanese-type leather and rubber shoes or Soviet hobmailed boots; they were accompanied by a large number of pack horses loaded with food and ammunition. They appeared to be fresh and rested troops.
