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SECURITY INFORMATION

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1. The following report contains a breakdown of the Polish Border Guard (W.O.P.). WOP is currently one of the main departments of the Ministry for State Security (MBP). Chief of the department and of WOP is Col. (Inu) Grabowski.
2. The WOP is divided into 12 brigades. A brigade is composed of five battalions and about 3,500 officers and men. Each battalion of about 500-550 officers and men is responsible for 25 border points.
3. The 12 brigades have headquarters at the following places:

6. Each border point (straznice) is manned as follows:
- a. Chief officer
 - b. Second officer: in charge of border intelligence
 - c. Eight NCO's: One in charge, two for communications, four assigned to guard groups, one conducting (sic) NCO.***
7. One border point command may be responsible for a sector of five to eight kilometers, depending upon the terrain. A patrol consists of two guardsmen who are on duty four hours. During one shift there are four to six patrols on duty. The particular sector of each patrol is kept secret until immediately before the guards go on duty. In addition to the regular patrols, there are alert and ambush points (czujki i zasadzki) placed a little behind the border. If the border is not a river or sea, a dog on a lead accompanies the patrol.****
8. There are special WOP units consisting of two or three officers and 16 men assigned to various authorized border crossing points. Their job is to check travelers' documents and luggage, railway carriages, locomotives, and automobiles as they cross.
9. WOP officers are trained at the Centrum Wyszkolenia WOP. The dogs the WOP uses are trained at the Centralny Zarzad Tresury Psow Granicznych, at Runowo, Woj. Koszalinские.

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Comment: Soldiers are usually trained between May and September. When their training is completed, they are usually sworn in and assigned to border guard duty. 1951 swearing-in ceremonies were held between 20 September and 1 October, but the new guards were not immediately assigned to border duty. They received instead instruction in night and street-fighting; on 16 October 1951, they were assigned as replacements for WOP guards who were being demobilized. The new men replaced a group who had been told shortly before the expiration of their two-year term that they would be required to serve an additional year. This order did not materialize.



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** - Comment: Four of these NCO's are in charge of supply stores.

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*** Comment: The conducting NCO is thought to be assigned to the changing of the guard.

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**** - Comment: Otherwise dogs are kept at battalion headquarters only.

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
