1. [redacted] the North Korean and Chinese Communist governments were sponsoring an all-Asian "Anti-American Militarist Council," meeting to be held at the same time as the forthcoming Peiping Peace Conference. The Anti-American Militarist Council is providing funds and arms for the Japanese Communists.
2. The Korean representatives on this council have the most important role because through the Korean residents in Japan an elaborate espionage system has been organized in that country. The council is planning to organize a training base in Manchuria for North Korean guerrilla leaders who escaped from the Chiri Mountain area in South Korea, and for Korean Communists in Japan. Korean Communists in Japan who wish to join in the training program may use a secure underground route from Hokkaido to Karafuto to Sakhalin, with transportation from Sakhalin to the continent by Soviet boats.
3. Korean delegates on the Anti-American Militarist Council are: CHO Hyon-ku; editor of North Korean cultural propaganda publications and member of the Central Committee of the Democratic Front for Unification of the Fatherland; PAK Chong-ae; chairman of the Democratic Women's Alliance and winner of the Stalin peace prize in April 1951; SU Man-su; and YI Kang-kun.<sup>1</sup>

1. [redacted] Comment: A YI Kang-kun was chief of security intelligence in the North Korean security force in early 1951.
