1. On 1 July 1952, a Soviet-operated radar station was on a hill at approximately 125-35, 39-09; YD-244354, north of Puch'ang-ni (125-36, 39-08) (YD-2534). The radar mast was approximately 5 meters high; and the antenna, which was continuously revolving, was ladder shaped and 2 meters in length. The hill was covered with chestnut trees and cryptomeria.
2. Approximately 15 Soviet signal and guard troops were in dugouts next to the radar station, and an additional 25 Soviet troops were in the village of Che-dong (125-35, 39-09) YD-2336), which is approximately 500 meters north of Puch'ang-ni. The troops were commanded by a Soviet lieutenant. They did their own cooking and household chores, and no Koreans were employed by them.
