THIS IS UNEVALUATED INFORMATION

- 1. The artillery battery attached to 146 Infantry Regiment, headquarters Kicevo, had about 70 men and the following armament:
 - a. 4 American Model 1941 76 mm guns. These guns were originally of 75 mm caliber, but the barrels were enlarged at an arms and ammunition factory in Kragujevac;
 - b. 12 Soviet Shpagen 7.62 mm sub-machine guns; and
 - c. 58 German Mauser 7.9 mm rifles.
- The 146 Regiment is a part of the 50 Infantry Division with headquarters at Kicevo.
- 3. One of the batteries assigned to 107 Artillery Regiment, headquarters Kicevo, had four American Model 1941 76 mm guns. Another battery of 107 Artillery Regiment had four 120 mm mortars. The 107 Artillery Regiment was assigned to 50 Infantry Division.
- 4. Captain Boris Trajkovski was the commanding officer of the mortar company attached to the headquarters of 165 Infantry Regiment in Bitolj. The 165 Infantry Regiment was assigned to 50 Infantry Division.
