## 1. Functions of the KBW:

## (a) Peacetime

- The liquidation of all anti-Polish Government groups; the investigation and apprehension or liquidation of all underground leaders and elements.
- (2) The protection of vital industrial installations and industrial areas.
- The guarding and securing of Polish political or State prisoners and prisoners of other nationalities in Polish prison camps.
- (4) Guard service with the Security Office (Urzad Bezpieczenstwa UB).

## (b) Wartime

- (1) The protection of supply areas immediately behind the fighting lines and protection of the rear areas against infiltration, enemy paratroop drops behind the lines, and other diversionary activities. In protecting these areas, KBW units are trained for and instructed to actively engage any enemy and, if possible, to hold or destroy him.
- (2) Military traffic control. In the fulfillment of this mission, the KBW would supervise military traffic control by the employment of women as military police.

- (3) The protection of government depots and supply dumps in non-combat areas.
- (4) Although KBW units are instructed and trained for fighting, they would be actively committed only when absolutely needed.
- 2. The actual T/O of a KBW brigade is about two thousand officers and EM; that of a regiment is about 1,600-1,800 officers and EM. The creating of brigades is a flexible item in the KBW, the need for personnel being governed by the degree of partisan activity in certain areas and the necessity for quelling such activity. From an organizational viewpoint, the only difference between a brigade and a regiment is that the former is composed of four battalions, while the latter is composed of three.

(c) Special KBW Brigade - Warsaw \( \sigma 5215N-2100E \)


The actual strength of this brigade is unknown to me but the T/O is about 2,000 officers and men. I have never seen or heard a numerical designation for this brigade. It has always been called "Special" because its mission was to guard high Government officials and Government office buildings. One company of this brigade was a combat company. I have no further information.

(d) 2nd KBW Regiment - Bialystok \( \sum\_{5308N-2309E} \)

Unknown CO: Maj Pliskin (fnu)

The actual peacetime strength of a KBW regiment is normally about 1,200 officers and men, but it may go as high as 1,600 (T/O strength). The wartime strength is not known to me. The 2nd KBW Regiment consists of three battalions, each composed of three companies and operates in the Bialystok area. The actual strength of the regiment is 90 officers, 160 NCO's, and 950 pvts. From March through April 1952, this regiment received support from the 4th KBW Regiment, Rzeszow, in carrying out anti-partisan activity in the Bialystok area. The Deputy Political Officer of this regiment is Capt Sowula (fnu), a Pole. The Chief of Staff is Maj George Zagorski, a Pole.
