We reviewed the exchange of correspondence between the Committee and the Agency relative to our cooperation in the Committee's preparation of a study on Communist China. Stark mentioned that lack of attribution to the authors of the Agency items gave them some problems since all other contributions were identified, however, he indicated that they could live with this arrangement if necessary. He pointed out, however, that he was quite certain this new study would attract considerable attention. Stark took this opportunity to mention that the Agency might want to "take a second look" at the Rush Greenslade piece prepared for the Committee's Soviet study since, as Stark put it, the item was rather "colorful." Stark was obviously thinking about the George Carver situation in making this suggestion.

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
