Progress report for June 1951

1. The Projects Review Committee has approved the establishment of Saigon Mission as a separate Bureau. A request for a permanent Table of Organization was forwarded to the Deputy Director for Administration on 27 June 1951.

2. [] Reports on broadcast indications of civil disaffection and other domestic difficulties in the USSR initiated under the OGC experimental Counter Psychological Warfare Project have been favorably received by IAC consumers. Arrangements are being made to publish similar reports on Communist China beginning about 1 October.

3. The Chief and three staff officers of FBID were given orientation in OSO and OGC operations.

4. Funds have been made available to the American Consul at Nicosia for settlement of the damage claim against the Mediterranean Bureau brought by [] in October, 1950.

5. As authorized by the ADO, arrangements were completed with Communications Division for FBID to handle classified telecommunications between FDD, Washington, and Allied Translator and Interpreter Service, Tokyo, the latter through FBIS Tokyo Bureau. Two exchanges of brief messages were serviced satisfactorily during the month of June.

6. [] OS-11, Information and Editorial Specialist at the London Bureau, entered the American University at Beirut to participate in the USAF-sponsored course which commenced 29 June.

FBID OPERATIONAL INFORMATION REPORT FOR JUNE 1951**I. FBID Project Status Report as of 30 June 1951****1. DPA, West German Press Service Coverage.**

To meet the expressed requirements of the Departments of State and Army and of OGI, the Deputy Director for Plans has approved additional facilities at the German Bureau to permit full coverage of DPA West German Press Service.

2. New West Coast Bureau Site.

The West Coast Bureau conducted further surveys in the area north of San Francisco Bay for a new WCB site.

3. Monitoring Stations in Pakistan.

A study of the requirements and costs involved in establishing a monitoring station at Karachi for the Pakistan Government and the problems involved in coordinating it with the proposed American operation at Lahore, were prepared and submitted along with the previously completed Central Asian monitoring study as annexes to the draft of a letter from the ADO to Mr. Ghulam Ahmed at Karachi.

4. Emergency Station Equipment and Stockpiling.

All items of equipment required under the Emergency Station Equipment and Stockpiling projects have been ordered. To date, 50 of 68 items requisitioned under the former and 14 of 500 items requisitioned under the latter project have been received. While most items are expected to be on hand within 60 days, deliveries will not be completed for several months.

5. Okinema Construction Projects.

Estimates of the cost of preparing final plans and specifications on construction projects by the Okinema Bureau are being obtained from the District Engineers and a local representative of a New York construction firm, Grove and Associates. Rough estimates of the cost of construction are also being obtained from several local contractors on Okinema. Contemplated construction includes: (a) four three-bedroom family housing units, (b) one typhoon shelter and DOQ structure, (c) a secure storage area of approximately 450 sq. ft. at Dolo Point.

6. IBM Treatment of Broadcast Station Lists.

Arrangements have been completed through Management Office for the conversion to IBM treatment of the unclassified broadcast station lists published by the Broadcast Information Section of FBID. Punching of the IBM cards will be done by Contacts Division. The machine treatment will permit simultaneous preparation of the entire series of publications. It was learned that the Department of State plans Rand machine treatment of other aspects of DIS data, and informal discussions have been held to coordinate the two operations.

7. Vehicles for Mediterranean Bureau.

Of the two replacement vehicles approved for the Mediterranean Bureau, one locally purchased Austin A-4 sedan was delivered on 5 May 1951; delivery of a 20-passenger bus is expected about the middle of July.

Daily summaries of USSR, Satellite and German broadcasts are delivered to local users in London and sent by teletype to consumers in Western Europe; i.e., American Embassy offices in London and Paris and The Hague; G-2, USA, Frankfurt; HICOG, Frankfurt; HICOG, Berlin; U.S. Delegation, Austrian Mission; North Atlantic Treaty Organization; SHAPE, etc.

All available transcripts and summaries of broadcasts of the Radio of Free Russia monitored by the IDC are transmitted to the U.S. Embassy in London.

Tokyo Bureau

All processed intercepts are sent to G-2, USA, FEC and the Intelligence Section, PFAF. A copy of the Korean file is transmitted to U.S. Embassy, Pusan, and G-2, Eighth Army via radioteletype. Selected material of Chinese International Service programs is filed to USIB, Formosa.*

Canton Bureau

All processed intercepts are filed to G-2, USA, FEC and Intelligence Section, PFAF. A copy of Peking intercepts is filed to USIB, Formosa. The weekly analysis of Chinese Communist regional broadcasts is regularly furnished G-2, FEC.*

Saigon Bureau

A copy of all processed material is filed to Tokyo for G-2, FEC.*

Hong Kong Bureau

Copies of Peking intercepts and Vietnam News Agency intercepts are filed to G-2, USA, FEC. G-2, FEC, also receives daily a copy of all Russian-language material and a copy of all material in English and French Morse sent by the Saigon office of AFP to their consumers in Southeast Asia.*

East Coast Bureau

Daily distribution of an epidemiological bulletin of the World Health Organization is made to the Office of Scientific Intelligence.

German Bureau

Copies of all processed material are sent to the Economic Branch and to the Radio and Press Branch, Office of Intelligence, HICOG.

Austrian Bureau

A daily file of selected material is furnished the Office of the Chief of Staff, USFA. The complete file of the Austrian Bureau is supplied to the Intelligence Coordination Branch, USFA, and to G-2, USFA Rear, Salzburg.

Mediterranean Bureau**SECRET**

Copies of all processed Soviet Kurdish-language intercepts are air mailed to American Embassy offices in Tehran and Baghdad. A Balkan roundup of significant news items is prepared and transmitted daily as a special service to the Office of Policy Coordination.


