Progress report for April 1951.

1. A survey of working conditions, morale, production and personnel policies of the Production Section in the Editorial Branch was conducted by the Chief, FBID. Each employee was interviewed; one typist was released; one typist was promoted. Certain modifications of existing rules were made and some innovations in policies were introduced. These efforts have resulted in approximately a 10% increase in production.

2. The Special Reports Branch has been reorganized without adding new positions by the establishment of a quantitative analysis section to perform central quantitative functions, of a chief editor with responsibility for publications, and of an analyst in the office of the branch chief with responsibility for Presidential reports and the weekly Trends and Highlights. The USSR and Far East Survey sections were reduced accordingly.

3. The owners of the land in the Santa Rosa area of California, which was inspected by the Chief Engineer of the West Coast Bureau, have posed objections to further considerations of their property by FBID. While this is probably a move to raise the asking price if purchase negotiations are opened, it has been decided to make a further search for suitable relocation sites, to include public lands held by the Department of Interior.

4. The following CIA officials were given an orientation in FBID operations, including a visit to the East Coast Bureau: Mr. Kingman Douglass, AD/CI, Mr. Max Milliken, AD/RR and Mr. J.P. Cramell, DAD/ER.

5. A system of coordinating the intercept [redacted] with London Bureau was initiated on 17 April. Although during the first two days London was relieved of relaying nearly 45% of the [redacted] subsequent sunspot disturbances halved this figure for the average April result. It is now believed that while the interception system will be very useful during normal conditions, it will not help appreciably during periods of atmospheric outages when it is needed most.

6. Coordination of field bureau commentary listings' deadlines with departmental activity was effected in order to provide CIA and State representatives on the IAC Watch Committee with advance copies of "Trends and Highlights of Moscow Broadcasts" on Tuesday afternoons. Thus, the latest significant information on Moscow's radio propaganda is available for Committee meetings.

7. A committee representing the collection units of the Agency is presently engaged in a study to determine how Agency facilities can best be utilized and coordinated to support the Office of Research and Reports in its mission relative to the formulation of economic intelligence on the economy of the USSR. As a participating member, FBID has submitted a report outlining Division methods and degree of exploitation of economic information on the USSR. The conclusion reached was that monitored foreign broadcasts as a source of economic information on the USSR are being exploited at the present time by FBID to the fullest possible extent.

8. Requisitioning to implement the equipment stock piling project has been completed. It is anticipated that procurement for this project will be completed during the current fiscal year.

9. The Department of State has indicated that [redacted] Reports dealing with quantitative analytical studies of Yugoslav-Communist propaganda have been "of considerable value" and "extremely useful" to the Department. [redacted] Reports on program characteristics of foreign broadcasting stations were considered to be "of value." The Department of Army reported that the subject matter of the reports were not of sufficient interest to warrant evaluation by them. 50X1 50X1

10. Instructions have been prepared for the field which will institute a check system on the exchange of teletype administrative traffic between departmental headquarters and field bureaus. Detection of missing messages which has been a major annoyance is assured by the adoption of procedures recommended by an expert of the Communications Division.

11. The employment of a qualified Tibetan monitor by the Tokyo Bureau plugs a gap in monitoring coverage which has been a matter of concern to certain analysts in OGI and OIR, Department of State. His entrance on duty coincided with an announcement by the Peking radio that its output in Tibetan would be doubled effective 1 May.

SECRET**II. Local Services Rendered by the Fields:****London Bureau**

Daily summaries of Western and Eastern European radio reaction to the Council of Deputy Foreign Ministers in Paris and to the major issues under discussion are made available to the American delegation attending the Conference. This special service will continue for the duration of the Conference.

Daily summaries of USSR, Satellite and German broadcasts are delivered to local users in London and sent by teletype to consumers in Western Europe; i.e., American Embassy offices in London and Paris and The Hague; G-2, USA, Frankfurt; HICOG, Frankfurt; HICOG, Berlin; U.S. Delegation, Austrian Missions; North Atlantic Treaty Organization, etc.

Tokyo Bureau

All processed intercepts are sent to G-2, USA, FEO and the Intelligence Section, FEAF. A copy of the Korean file is transmitted to U.S. Embassy, Pusan, and G-2, Eighth Army via radioteletype.

Osaka Bureau

All processed intercepts are filed to G-2, USA, FEO and Intelligence Section, FEAF. A copy of Peking intercepts is delivered to USIS Formosa via radioteletype to Tokyo and thence by air courier to Formosa. Korean material is radioteletyped to U.S. Embassy, Pusan and G-2, Eighth Army via Tokyo.

West Coast Bureau

A copy of Peking intercepts is filed to G-2, USA, FEO.

East Coast Bureau

Daily distribution of an epidemiological bulletin of the World Health Organization is made to the Office of Scientific Intelligence.

German Bureau

Copies of all processed material are sent to the Economic Branch and to the Radio and Press Branch, Office of Intelligence, HICOG.

Austrian Bureau

A daily file of selected material is furnished the Office of the Chief of Staff, USFA. The complete file of the Austrian Bureau is supplied to the Intelligence Coordination Branch, USFA, and to G-2, USFA Rear, Salzburg.

Mediterranean Bureau

Copies of all processed Soviet Kurdish-language intercepts are air mailed to American Embassy offices in Tehran and Baghdad. A Balkan roundup of significant news items is prepared and transmitted daily as a special service to the Office of Policy Coordination.*




