Progress Report for October 1956

OPERATIONS

ILLEGIB

1. Developments in Satellite countries necessitated temporary coverage reallocation to bring full FBIS-EBC potential into play. Mediterranean Bureau now monitors a number of Polish regionals in support of the EBC, and Vienna Bureau has been monitoring a number of Hungarian regional and clandestine transmitters. A temporary three-man team monitored from a height overlooking Vienna and phoned copy to the Bureau for final processing and transmission. The Bureau was commended for this initiative.

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2. The African Survey: Following surgery in a Rome hospital, [redacted] returned to Washington. [redacted] is recuperating in Kyrenia from hospitalization in Nicosia, preparatory to departure for Turkey to continue the survey with [redacted] Turkish Government clearance was received.

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3. Mediterranean Bureau reported a successful recruiting tour and the anticipated arrival in the near future of two excellent candidates for the newly created Arabic/Arabic Morse vacancies.

4. It was determined that ACAN and Comco facilities from Panama City are inadequate to support an emergency Latin American monitoring operation there, but up to 10,000 words of copy can be filed commercially from Balboa at a cost of \$850 a month. Study continues, and in the meantime the assignment of a cruising monitor, whose contribution would be limited to cruising information, was deferred.

5. Following a series of unusual delays in the forwarding of FBIS material through ACAN circuits an experimental three-page message limit was imposed on Kyrenia, London, and Okinawa. As results were favorable, it is planned to generalize this practice.

6. Television monitoring: Arrangements have been made for the Austrian Bureau to monitor the sound track of the Bratislava TV transmitter early in November and for a report of USIA's observations of the Tallinn transmitter. Authority for local experimentation in photographic and tape recording techniques was requested in a memorandum to the AD/O dated 23 October.

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7. In response to the DCI's proposal that FBID Daily Report material be sent to [redacted] RQM/OIS is sending a questionnaire to [redacted] This will provide a basis upon which FBID can prepare a staff study to determine the most economical way of accomplishing this purpose.

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8. A special letter will be sent by RQM/OIS [redacted] concerning the DCI's request for study of possible exchange of monitored material with [redacted]

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9. In conjunction with a study by Management Staff, letters have been written to the London, Mediterranean, and Hokkaido Bureaus suggesting a method of relieving reproduction pressures in headquarters by producing the Economic Abstracts in the field. If found practicable, this important function will be transferred to the bureaus supplying this material.

10. Polish, Hungarian and Middle East developments produced a "B" wire daily file averaging 43,300 words (normal 20,000) and a Daily Report averaging 364 pages during the last five days of the month. For the month, the Daily Report averaged 103,000 words per day.

11. A representative of OCB and the FBID Projects Officer confer each Tuesday afternoon on FBID material to be used at the OCB staff briefing on Wednesday. This collaboration has made unnecessary the preparation of special written reports for OCB.

12. The major Radio Propaganda Branch issuance was a study of the Soviet-Yugoslav ideological controversy over "independent roads to socialism" and the manner in which that controversy has been reflected in Satellite propaganda. Other special reports reviewed Soviet propaganda exploitation of the Suez crisis and analyzed the slogans released for the October Revolution anniversary. [redacted]

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14. **FBIS services during the month included the following:**

a. In addition to Daily Report publication, special printings were run and special distribution given to the Polish Home Service excerpts of the speech by Wladyslaw Gonsulka at the Eighth Plenum of the Polish United Workers Party Central Committee. The same treatment was given to the Plenum Decisions. A copy of the Gonsulka speech, airmailed to the Vienna Bureau, enabled the Bureau to complete the speech from the press versions available there, thus allowing full text publication.

b. All Satellite material from London and Mediterranean Bureaus is now airmailed daily to [redacted]

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c. Egyptian leader speeches are now triplicated on tape and sent to [redacted]

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d. At White House request, selected "B" wire service through the Agency watch officer was initiated on 31 October. It is understood that the White House communications center is investigating the establishment of regular "B" wire service on a telephone company line.

FACILITIES

15. A letter dated 10 October from the ADCI to the Secretary of Defense cited FBIS requirements for continuing to fulfill its mission at Bolo Point, Okinawa, in view of the proposed construction and operation of Marine Corps air support facilities at Bolo airstrip. The Chief, Okinawa Bureau was authorized to conduct joint tests with the Marines on separation requirements to eliminate reception interference.

16. The Chief, Tokyo Bureau reported the erection of an eight-story hospital across the street from FBIS operations building. He was directed to contact [redacted] to obtain advice and support in arranging with the Japanese authorities for the inclusion of anti-interference devices in the new building.

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17. The final phase of the Okinawa housing construction project is 58% complete, with utilities for this housing 60% complete.

18. Post-typhoon rehabilitation in Okinawa: Work on Beverage Antennas has been completed and is still in progress with the Rhombic Antennas, window frames in the operations area and roofs in the GSMK Housing Area.

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19. Authorization was given to the West Coast Bureau for installation of power line filters at a cost of \$202.33 to eliminate noise from a power line extension to be used in adjacent construction.

20. Approval was granted to expand the library at the East Coast Bureau by making an archway between the present library and the Chief Engineer's Office. The Chief Engineer will move to the Assistant Bureau Chief's Office and the latter will be provided with office space by partitioning the east side of the foyer with folding doors. Approval was also granted for repairing and painting the interior of the Operations Building. GSA has given a cost estimate of \$2600 for both jobs.

ADMINISTRATION

21. Allocations of 1957 allotted funds were made to the field bureaus and to Logistics for Property Issuance.

22. Personnel: During October, two persons were separated from FBID and five entered on duty. Classified on-duty-strength on 30 October was eight under ceiling. Twenty-four applications were in process.

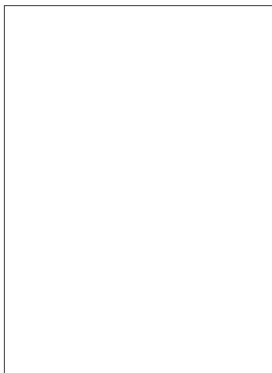

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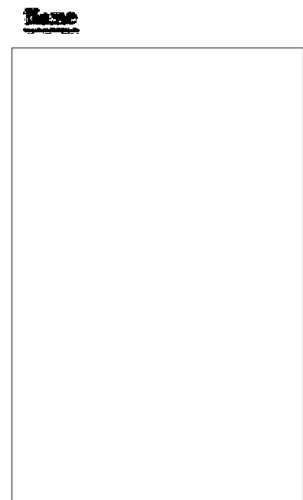

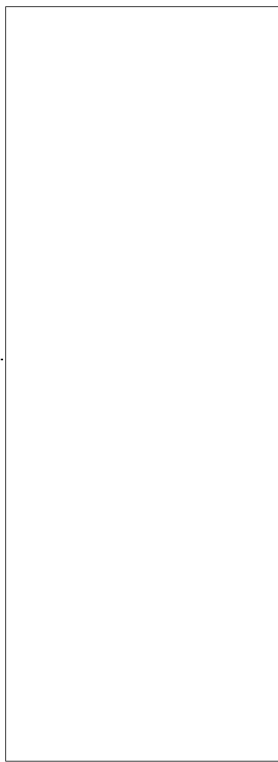
