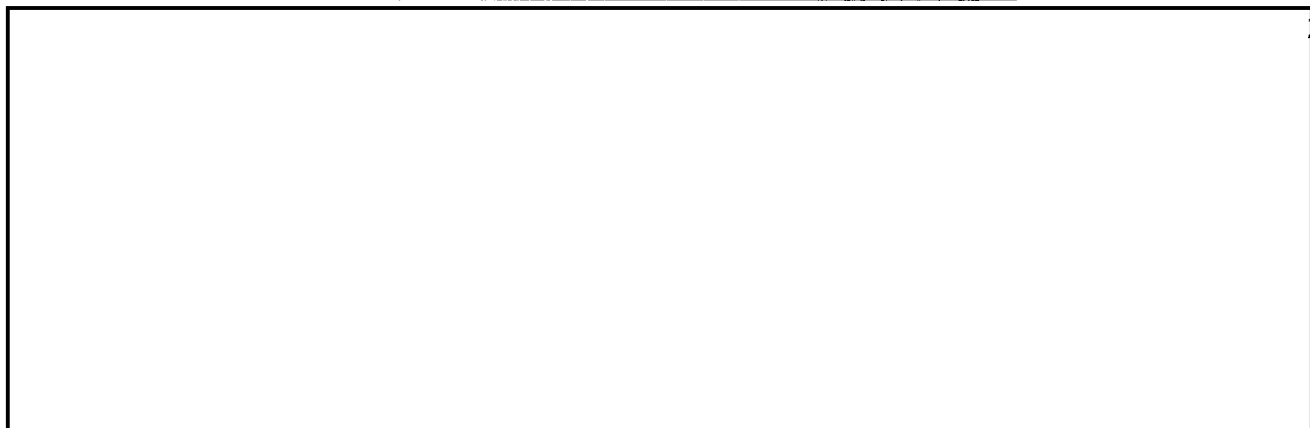

Legislative Developments. On 19 May the House, by a roll call vote of 357 in favor to 23 opposed, passed H.R. 6068, the Fiscal Year 1983 Intelligence Authorization Bill. The Bill contains provisions granting limited statutory entitlements to former spouses of CIA employees with respect to retirement and survivor annuities. It also contains an amendment to the Central Intelligence Agency Retirement and Disability System which would benefit CIARDS participants having more than 35 years of service by providing for a refund of excess retirement system contributions. (U)

On 20 May the Senate Judiciary Committee, by a vote of 17-0, reported a substitute compromise version of S. 1730 offered by Senator Orrin Hatch. This Bill deals with government-wide relief from certain features of the FOIA, but it does not address major Intelligence Community concerns. (U)

The Conference Report on the Intelligence Identities Protection Act has been filed. If all goes well, it is possible that the Report could be adopted by both the Senate and the House before the Memorial Day recess. (U)

Paisley v. CIA. The United States District Court for the District of Columbia recently granted summary judgment for the government in this FOIA case on all but one document. The major issue was the claim of the Agency and the FBI that some 61 documents were congressional documents not subject to the FOIA. Judge Gasch agreed and ruled that these documents may not be released. (U)
