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MEMORANDUM FOR GENERAL SMITH

In CIA 11-50, "REVIEW OF THE WORLD SITUATION AS IT RELATES TO THE SECURITY OF THE UNITED STATES," dated 13 November 1950, the last sentence on page ii of the Summary reads:

"Containment of Ho's forces presently depends almost exclusively on U.S. aid, and even with such help (short of direct ground, air, and naval support) the French probably cannot hold northern Indochina for more than six months, nor all of Indochina for more than eighteen months.

This somewhat definite statement derives from "PROSPECTS FOR CHINESE COMMUNIST ACTION IN INDOCHINA DURING 1950" (ORE 50-50 Supplement). This paper is based on information available to CIA as of 5 September 1950, and it is concurred in by the Departments of State, Navy, and Air Force. There is a dissent by the Department of Army (G-2), but not in relation to the following pertinent paragraph (Page 9, Section 1, paragraph 2):

"Despite this general capability and despite the existence of Chinese Communist military concentrations along the Indochina border, adequate for the task, it is estimated that an open Chinese Communist invasion-while possible and capable of being launched with little or no preliminary warning-is improbable in 1950 because considerations (from the standpoint of Ho Chi Minh, the Chinese Communists, and international Communism) favoring such action appear to be outweighed by considerations opposing it.
