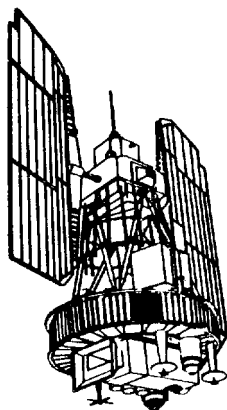





- OPM is currently developing an optional suggestion form that will be

available for use by all Government agencies. Agencies will have an opportunity to review and comment on this proposed form when it has been designed. The new form will incorporate all of the required elements and include features that are currently contained in forms being used by most departments and agencies.
