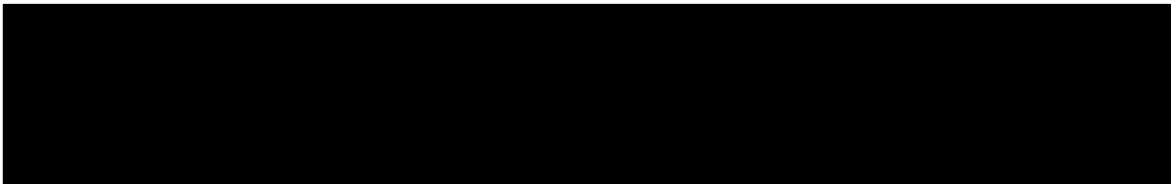

25X1A 1. On 6 April 1979, the undersigned escorted Ms. Keyes

25X1A scheduled 10 a.m. briefing by [REDACTED] For approx-
25X1A imately one and one half hours, [REDACTED] conducted a most
comprehensive monologue covering the history, theory and
present day utilization of the polygraph. He noted the checks
and balances in effect to preclude misuse of the device; the
training requirement for Agency examiners, the techniques
utilized to elicit information and very carefully pointed
out the role of the polygraph as an investigative tool in
the overall security processing.

2. To the best recollection of the undersigned, Ms. Keyes
availed herself of the opportunity to ask questions only once
during the briefing. At one point, she inquired as to who
received waivers from the polygraph process. [REDACTED] 25X1A
responded by pointing out that Presidential appointees are
not required to be polygraphed but most, if not all, have
volunteered for testing. He also, discussed at some length
the fact that waivers have been granted on medical grounds
but in toto we are talking about a very small percentage of
applicants. Ms. Keyes did not pursue the matter any further.

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25X1A 3. Following [REDACTED] briefing the undersigned gave Ms. Keyes a brief rundown on the theory and staffing of the Applicant Review Panel. She had previously been briefed on this process and simply wanted to fill in the gaps in her recollection of the Panel's function.
