out the role of the polygraph as an investigative tool in
the overall security processing.

2. To the best recollection of the undersigned, Ms. Keyes availed herself of the opportunity to ask questions only once during the briefing. At one point, she inquired as to who received waivers from the polygraph process.

25X1A responded by pointing out that Presidential appointees are not required to be polygraphed but most, if not all, have volunteered for testing. He also, discussed at some length the fact that waivers have been granted on medical grounds but in toto we are talking about a very small percentage of applicants. Ms. Keyes did not pursue the matter any further.
