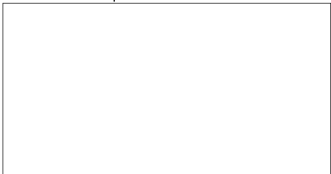

QUESTION AREA: Counterintelligence

QUESTION 16. The Office of Security projects an increase in investigative case load in FY 1983 in FY 1984 and an equivalent number in FY 1985 (plus whatever is required due to increased hiring in FY 1985). Projected case completions rise more slowly from in FY 1983 to in FY 1984 and in FY 1985. This leaves a shortfall in FY 1984 in 1985.

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16 a. This Committee provided extra investigative personnel in FY 1982. Did the increment help the situation in the short term? In the long term? (C)

ANSWER.

The 17 new positions allocated to the Reinvestigations Program in FY 1982 have been used initially to cope with the more pressing need for new employee investigations resulting from the expanding Agency population and with the continuing increase in industrial contractor clearance requests. These new positions combined with subsequent increased manning authorization gives us the capability to reduce the existing backlog in our Reinvestigations Program. Whether we can reduce the backlog, however, will depend on other priorities as well. If Agency growth continues and industrial contractor clearance requests continue to climb, more investigative resources will again have to be applied to staff employee and industrial contractor cases.

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16 b. Given the projected shortfalls, what level of performance is projected to reinvestigate contractor employees? To investigate new applicants for employment with contractors?

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ANSWER.

The Office of Security's capability to reinvestigate industrial contractors will still be severely limited. It is anticipated that only those cases identified as top priority will be accommodated.

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With the planned FY 1984 increase in resources, the Office of Security anticipates completing all initial clearance requests for contractor employees; however, it is highly unlikely that we will be able to reduce to a desired level the number of days required to conduct the investigation.

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16 c. How many personnel would be needed to handle your case load? Given the need to hire only highly qualified personnel and to give them proper training, how many new hires can you absorb in a year?

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ANSWER.

In order to meet our FY 1984 projected workload we would require investigators, polygraph examiners, adjudicators and clerical employees for a total of new hires. The FY 1984 budget currently contains investigators, polygraph examiners, adjudicators and clerical personnel for a total of positions. Therefore, additional personnel would be required to meet our case load.

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The Office of Security believes it can identify and hire professionals during the course of a fiscal year. A total of could be trained and absorbed during the same time frame.

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
