



## A Profile

The success of a program such as this one can only be measured in the achievements of the alumni; in the 18 years of the IFP its alumni have distinguished themselves in ways that reflect upon the uniquely interdiscipanary

character of the program itself.

When the seventeenth class of Fellows completed their year with the Program in May 1976, the alumni total reached 800. Of these, about 150 are continuing graduate study, mostly completing Ph.D. and J.D. degrees. The remainder are pursuing diverse careers, both in the United States and all over the world.


