From the smoke-filled room: 'Something' going on in CIA

The Central Intelligence Agency, as you know, is a large government bureaucracy wholly devoted to spying. They spy on our enemies, on our friends, and though they are not supposed to, they have spied on us. But then as an individual close to the spy business said, "Judgment is a difficult in the intelligence community." So it must be.

But these are new days around Langley, Virginia, where the CIA has its headquarters. Not too many months ago, no road signs even mentioned the large building set back in the rolling and wooded Virginia hills where several thousand people work. One discreet marker did point toward it, however, but identified the place as the "Bureau of Public Roads." Certainly there must have been one or two ignorant citizens who drove out to complain about the pothole in the street in front of their home, but were stopped by the electrified, barbed-wire topped fence and armed guards that surrounded the "Bureau." Now the fence and guards are still in place, but in

this day of complete disclosure, the road sign reads "Central Intelligence Agency."

Do not, however, come to the mistaken conclusion that one can drive out to Langley, park the car, and watch the spies at work. A proposal to open the agency to public tours was recently abandoned, presumably when the KGB in Lubyanka Prison in Moscow would offer no similar excursion. Besides, tourists from Dubuque in Bermuda shorts popping off Instamatics is not in keeping with the James Bond image of international espionage. But for serious scholars, the CIA will entertain visits in the inner sanctum of what one moderate Third World leader described as the international center of terror and reaction.

So I of course went. Under the auspices of the University (how do they know us? Hmmm), the spies were more than willing to accommodate. On the appointed morning, a plain blue bus pulled in front of an office building in Rosslyn, Virginia. This large, mysterious building had no name on the front, and only a small

foyer that was full of uniformed guards. A nice little old lady doled out passes to board the blue bus, when proper identification had been thoroughly scrutinized. Half a dozen non-descript other individuals also boarded the blue bus, flashing picture ID's that were worn around the neck. They didn't talk.

So the bus rattled out to the CIA's headquarters. Set in hundreds of acres of wooded hills, the spy center is a very impressive, even handsome building, about twelve stories tall, and from what was seen from the outside, apparently shaped like a giant "C". Glass and aluminum, its roof supporting a few complicated looking antennas, the place looks gray against the gray of the Eastern winter. Having taken down names, a guard points up the walk to the main entrance.

Inside, all is white marble and purity. In the floor is a seal of the agency, about twenty feet across; an eagle set atop a shield containing a multi-pointed star glares to the left. What the eagle sees on the wall is a quotation from John carved in the stone—"Ye shall know the Truth, and the Truth shall set ye Free." On the opposite wall are chiseled 31 stars, for Americans who died in the service of the agency. A book

below lists the names, but only a third of the names are there. The rest are secret. Those foreigners who also suffered remain anonymous, receiving undoubtedly the thanks of our grateful nation, along with the 31 commemorated.

But now is time for things to begin in earnest. An elevator heads up to the twelfth floor, and into a briefing room. A young man with fashionably long hair, wire-rim glasses, and snappy clothes introduces himself as an Assistant for Academic Relations. We are not cloak-and-dagger men around here, he says. We read books. We no longer commit dirty tricks, he says, and anyone who did would be immediately denounced by his fellow spies.

Castro is safe from exploding cigars.

The CIA, we are to understand, is a big university—full of scholars and researchers pushing back the frontiers of knowledge. Even if the knowledge aspired to involves warheads in Leningrad and Hua Kuo-Feng's bathroom habits, the idea is the same. Yes, yes.

A senior analyst in South African affairs arrives to speak. He is a very serious middle-aged man, and comprehensively knowledgeable about the

situation in South Africa. Does anybody listen to him?

We are to have a tour. The Assistant for Academic Relations leads us down long corridors to a large glass door. Next to the door is another large seal, underneath of which are the words "Directorate of Operations." Inside a rumpled man who looks as if he should be selling life insurance explains that in this department wire service copy is read to glean important intelligence. Sure enough, in the next room sit tickers for the AP, UPI, Reuters, New York Times, etc., clacking away. Sure enough, men sit at desks reading about hockey scores, Congressional speeches and striking farmers.

Two generations ago, Henry Stimson as Secretary of War dismissed the need for an intelligence service, saying "Gentlemen don't read other men's mail." Now we read their mail, if only because they read ours. Walking down those corridors to the wire-ticker readers, the Assistant for Academic Relations asked me what I thought about things at Langley. I replied that his talk had been most reassuring, but that I still had the feeling that something was going on. He smiled at all the unmarked doors and said, "There is . . ."

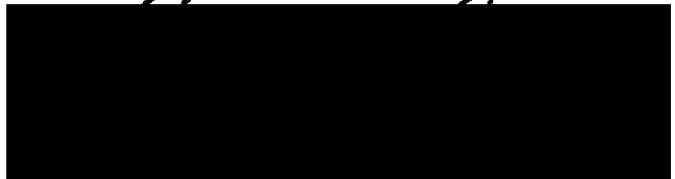

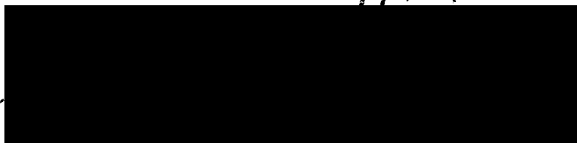

Thank you for your letter of September 21. I would like very much to have my students visit the CIA Operations Center in January, to hear ██████████ speaking about the role of intelligence in support of the foreign policy-making process, and to hear a briefing by agency regional specialists. We will be studying the problems of southern Africa and the Middle East, and therefore my preference in regional specialists would involve either Africa, the Middle East, or both.
