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TERMS OF REFERENCE  
FOR PREPARATION OF  
TARGET-ORIENTED DISPLAY

A Target-Oriented Display of intelligence resources will be developed by representatives of the Department of Defense, the Director of Central Intelligence, the Bureau of the Budget, and the National Reconnaissance Office. These Terms of Reference for preparation of this display consist of the following sections:

1. Purpose of Display
2. Targets and Time Period to be Displayed
3. Intelligence Resources to be Included in the Display
4. Preparation of the Display

1. Purpose of Display

The display will be used by a small group including the Secretary and Deputy Secretary of Defense, the Director of Central Intelligence, the Director of the Bureau of the Budget, and their immediate staffs.

The purposes of the display are to:

- a. Identify resources supporting national intelligence programs of the United States. IS LIMITING WORDING? POSSIBLE
- b. Depict, in terms of objective targets, where intelligence resources have been used and where they are programmed. DON'T USE THIS WORD. AVOID DEFINITIONAL ARGUMENT.
- c. Provide a basis for selective analyses of the value of U.S. intelligence requirements and the effectiveness of U.S. intelligence programs. INSIST ON DELETING THIS CONTROVERSIAL + CONFUSING

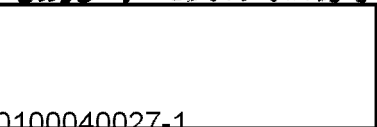

2. Targets and Time Period to be Displayed

[Primarily] <sup>THE ALLOCATION OF</sup> the display will show <sup>new</sup> U.S. intelligence resources [have been and currently are allocated] to regions and countries. For the Soviet Union, China, and possibly <sup>CERTAIN</sup> other selected countries or regions, resources will be allocated in greater detail to specific military capabilities, <sup>AND OTHER</sup> [and] economic, <sup>COUNTRY</sup> [and] political activities. [The regional, national, and functional classifications will comprise 20-30 basic elements.] <sup>ENTRIES IN THE MATRICES</sup> The final list of [elements] will depend on the committee's evaluation of their significance, their meaningfulness, and on the ability to acquire data

In addition, the report will include other data displays where resources will be related to targets and classified by:

a. Intelligence functions including various forms of collection, processing, mapping and charting, production, and counterintelligence.

Detail will be collected only to the extent that it makes a quantitative difference to the summary report, or that it is necessary to establish validity. Wherever possible, existing management information systems will be utilized. In each display, the size of unallocated funds will be kept small; however, the group will not attempt to develop sophisticated formulas for proration.

3. Intelligence Resources to be Included in the Display

The display will include the <sup>INITIAL</sup> Consolidated Cryptologic Program, <sup>ONLY</sup> the Consolidated Intelligence Program, <sup>THE</sup> and National Reconnaissance Program; and the Central Intelligence Agency program <sup>SIZE OF</sup> excluding Covert Action.

In addition, the display will include:

a.

b. One-third of the SR-71 program.

d. Preparation of the Display *← WHY "ONE-THIRD"? WILL NOT INCLUDE NON-C.I.P. GENERAL INTEL. RESOURCES OF D.C.I.*

The display will be prepared in five phases:

a. During the first phase, which will last until 1 July 1967, \*

the committee will generate detailed guidance for data collection and analysis. Detailed guidance will include AND FUNCTIONAL SUBDIVISIONS both specific target [categories] and supporting data required. *← WHO WILL ANALYZE THAT? DELETES OR CLARIFY*

b. During the second phase, which will last until 1 August 1967, CIA, DIA, ERG and NSA will prepare data displays and exhibits covering their own resources.

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- c. During the third phase, which will last until 1 September 1967, the ~~data will be collated,~~ <sup>COMMITTEE WILL PROVIDE FOR THE COLLATION OF THE DATA</sup> ~~a draft report will be prepared,~~ <sup>AND THE PREPARATION OF A DRAFT REPORT</sup> and further data needs, if any, will be identified.
- d. During the fourth phase, which will last until 1 October 1967, additional data will be submitted by CIA, DIA, NRO and NSA and a final report will be prepared <sup>BY THE COMMITTEE.</sup>

The above schedule is approximate and will be changed as mutually agreed upon by the representatives of the DOD, DCI, BCS and NRO.

Final Report - The committee's final report will consist of:

- a. The display.
- b. A discussion of the display and its limitations.
- c. A description of how the display was prepared. In this way future target-oriented displays can be refined and related to the initial attempt.
- d. Recommendations for further action.

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
