

MEMORANDUM FOR THE RECORD

SUBJECT : Cuban Missile Crisis Exhibit

The following comments by visitors to the Cuban Missile Crisis Exhibit, Corridor D, Headquarters, 9 October 1972 - 16 February 1973, are representative of those deposited in a box provided for the purpose. The ratio of complimentary remarks to derogatory remarks is also representative of the overall comments on the exhibit. The consensus is that the exhibit was very well received and that both veteran and new employees would like to see--and take great pride in--more displays of this kind. The uncomplimentary remarks fall into two general categories: (1) those who prefer "extra-curricular" displays, and (2) those who felt that the Cuban exhibit was displayed for too long a time.

This is without a doubt the best exhibit I have ever seen shown here. Good show! I should like to see more of this caliber.

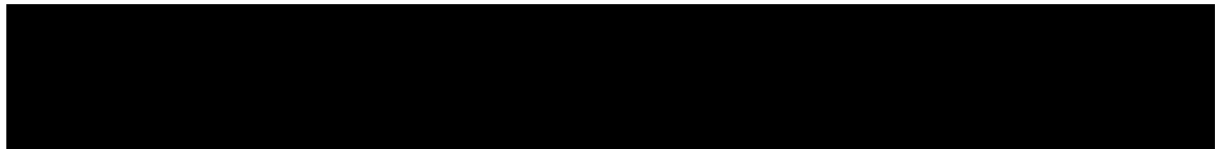
An exceptional display. Would like to see more like it.

SUBJECT: Terminating the Missile Crisis Exhibit

My 14 December note to Executive Director (cc to you on same date) establishing 20 January as a termination date for your exhibit, was "pre-mature." Colby's reply to me says "Hold at least through January -- per DCI." A memorandum from DDS on the same subject says the DCI wants the exhibit continued "at least until February." (The DDS' memorandum also contains some commendatory comments. Therefore here's a copy.)

I'm replying to DDS' memorandum by agreeing that yes, please consult the DCI again the latter part of January, and let me know so that I can let you know. (I assume you're in no rush to get the missile crisis exhibit put away, and the FAC is in no rush to replace it with anything else. My concern instead is in not pushing the exhibit to the point of boredom.)

 1. I had tentatively established 20 January as the termination date for the Missile Crisis exhibit, based on [REDACTED] statement that the DCI is interested in having it hung only until then, and based also on the fact that all scheduled special interests will have been satisfied by that date. The latter includes all family days, a visit from the Foreign Service Senior Seminar on 15 January, and the photographic record of the exhibit that OTR plans to make. However I took the precaution of checking whether the Executive Director has any special interest in continuing beyond the 20 January date, and he replied with a note saying, "Hold at least through January, per DCI." Meanwhile I also had received your memorandum.

 2. I would be grateful if you will get the DCI's views in the latter part of January, as you offered, and let me know them. Meanwhile we have extended the exhibition indefinitely.

3. I am keeping NPIC informed, and also [REDACTED] in his Intelligence Museum Commission capacity. STATINTL


SUBJECT : Cuban Missile Crisis Exhibit

1. At the Morning Meeting on 13 December the Director expressed the desire that the Cuban Missile Crisis exhibit continue in the 1D corridor at headquarters at least until February 1973. He verified that others at the meeting agreed with this and received positive confirmation of the value of the exhibit in a wide range of liaison relationships. The Legislative Counsel has been particularly interested in showing the exhibit to the broad list of Members of Congress.

2. We will need to consult on when this exhibit is to be closed and I would propose to recheck the ultimate date with the Director at a Morning Meeting the latter part of January.

3. I would be interested to know if this extended time period requires adjustment of any other plans for the 1D corridor.

SUBJECT: *Terminating the Missile Crisis exhibit*

As best I can determine all special interests in the Cuban Missile Crisis exhibit will have been satisfied by 20 January: all family days will have come and gone and the viewing by the foreign service senior seminar will have been completed (15 Jan). Moreover, OTR tells me, the 20 January date will give it time to make the photographic record that the DCI wanted.

██████████ tells me the DCI wants the exhibit hung until 20 January but does not care if it comes down thereafter. Thus I've tentatively set a 20 January termination date.

This is to ask whether you have any interest in continuing the exhibition beyond 20 January. Otherwise we'll firm up that date.

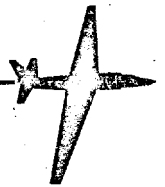

1. Cuban Missile Crisis Exhibit: [REDACTED] along with his colleagues, ran through a flip chart book showing the organization and content of a proposed exhibit on the above subject. Their presentation also included a drawing of Corridor 1 A and the number of panels required for the exhibit.

The committee discussed problems of lighting and mode of hanging. The Chairman requested Mr. Pforzheimer to obtain information available from the National Gallery or Archives with regard to appropriate light for the preservation of documents, but with proper illumination.
