The Hoover Institution on War, Revolution and Peace, founded at Stanford University in 1919 by the late President Herbert Hoover, describes themselves as an interdisciplinary research center for advanced study on domestic and international affairs in the twentieth century.

This highly regarded institute has published annually for the past 12 years a very well respected "Yearbook on International Communist Affairs." This is considered to be the "Bible" on communist parties around the world.

Principal fields of research: War, revolution and peace, including multidisciplinary studies on military aspects of war, political, economic and social causes and consequences of war, modern strategy, nuclear war, arms limitation, propaganda and psychological warfare, control of public opinion both in war and in peace, revolutionary movements, nationalism, imperialism, socialism, communism, fascism, national socialism, diplomatic, economic and cultural relations, supply, distribution and conservation of food and organization of peace through international administration and law. Also provides research facilities for visiting scholars and government officials from the United States and abroad.

Research results published in professional journals, books, monographs and bibliographies. Maintains a library of 1,250,000 volumes of books and government documents plus some 3,598 archival units, including papers of world-famous statesmen, diplomats and military figures, also substantial quantities of posters, maps, tapes, photos and film; principal geographic collecting areas are the United States, Eastern and Western Europe, East Asia (China and Japan), Africa, Latin America and the Middle East; Dr. Richard F. Staar, associate director for library operations.
